

# BERRYVILLE SHOW IS BEST EVER HELD

Three Days' Events Attracted More Than 20,000 Spectators—Keen Competition in Various Contests.

Winchester, Va., August 24.—Darkness enveloped the grounds of the Clarke County Horse Show Association at Berryville this evening before the eleventh annual exhibition, which was completed. Notwithstanding the lateness of the race, nearly all the 8,000 people in attendance during the day remained until the show closed. Much money changed hands during the racing events. E. H. Weatherbee's famous horse, Dan, which won many prizes during the London horse show early this summer, carried off first honors in the championship class for hunters this afternoon, over thirteen other noted horses. Lady Bird, exhibited by E. B. Jacobs, won the silver cup, donated by the United States Cavalry Association, in the charger class, and Major Purcell owned by Robert M. Henry, of Winchester, won first money in the class for speedway horses, trotting a mile to a four-wheeled vehicle in 2:40.

# WELLS WILL MEET KNOCKOUT BROWN

New York, August 24.—It was definitely announced to-night by George McDonald, manager for Wells, that the English lightweight champion, Wells, will be matched to meet Knockout Brown, of New York, in a ten-round bout at Madison Square Garden on August 30. This is the first bout scheduled under the new State Boxing Law, and the announcement of the match was immediately upon receipt of its sanction from the boxing commission. The bout will be held under the auspices of the Twentieth Century Athletic Club. It has been arranged for the men to weight in at 135 pounds at 4 P. M. on the day of the fight. Wells is being trained by Charley White and has been selected as referee.

New York, August 24.—The Giants and Pirates broke even in a double-header to-day, the contests developing into two great battles of pitchers. Mathewson was bested by Herzog in the first game, a muffed foul by Herzog in the sixth inning starting Mathewson's downfall, as Adams followed with a clean hit, leading to Pittsburgh's first score. Mathewson held the batter of Camnitz in the second, holding the Pirates to two hits, which they bunched for their only run in the fifth.
