ANNUAL SESSION OF FARMERS ENDS

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Raleigh, N. C., August 31.—The North Carolina Farmers' Convention closed its annual session at the Agricultural and Mechanical College here to-day, with the election of W. J. Shuford, of Hickory, as president, and the reelection of L. O. Schaub, of Agricultural and Mechanical College, as secretary.

The session has been especially successful in the matter of the value of paper, and addresses bearing on practical problems of farming. The attendance was disappointingly small, there being less than 800.

The last day of the convention opened with a demonstration of stock judging at the college barns by J. C. McNutt. There was a lecture by A. M. Swannerton, manager of the Pinebluff farm, on "Methods of Farming in the South," in which the great benefits to the farmers being obtained through the acre plots of land, in many sections cultivated under the direction of the State Department of Agriculture, were brought out by W. J. Shuford, of Hickory, made a talk that impressed many on the results of co-operative marketing in Catawba county.

SENATOR SWANSON DEFENDS RECORD

Makes Reply to Charges Brought Against Him by Glass.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Suffolk, Va., August 31.—Delayed for hours by a wreck, Senator Claude A. Swanson arrived here after 8 o'clock this evening. After changing his attire, he hurried to the Academy of Music, where he was scheduled to speak in behalf of his candidacy for the United States Senate. Despite the fact that there had been a heavy downpour of rain during the afternoon, there was a large crowd to greet the Senator. The audience showed its appreciation of Mr. Swanson's address, interrupting him frequently with prolonged applause. Mr. Swanson said he was glad to defend himself against the charges brought against him by his opponent, Carter Glass. He referred to his record as Governor, and said that he left a balance in the treasury, instead of a deficit, as charged by Mr. Glass. He answered every charge that had been brought against him. He admitted speculating in American tobacco company stock, but said that at the time Congress was not in session. He assailed Mr. Glass for being a director and stockholder of the American National Bank while he (Glass) was a member of the House Banking and Currency Committee. He stated that Mr. Glass had placed himself in an irreconcilable position that could not be defended.

TEXT OF AMENDMENT TO PUBLICITY LAW

Inasmuch as the alleged failure of Representatives Jones and Glass to file their campaign expense statements with the clerk of the United States Senate within the time required by the act providing for the purpose of auditing in the existing campaign, and in the recent amendments to the law are here given in full. Neither Mr. Jones nor Mr. Glass made any statement regarding the matter.

The penalty does not appear in the act providing for the purpose of auditing in the bill passed by the past Republican Congress. It is a fine of not exceeding \$1,000 and imprisonment for not more than one year.

The new portion of the law is as follows: "An act to amend an act entitled 'An act providing for the purpose of auditing in the bill passed by the past Republican Congress. It is a fine of not exceeding \$1,000 and imprisonment for not more than one year.'

"Every person who shall be a candidate for nomination at any primary election or nominating convention, or for endorsement at any general or special election, as Representative in the Congress of the United States, shall, not less than ten nor more than fifteen days before the day of holding such primary election or nominating convention, and not less than ten nor more than fifteen days before the day of holding such general or special election at which Representatives are to be elected, file in the office of the clerk of the House of Representatives at Washington, D. C., with said clerk, an itemized detailed statement, and on each sixth day thereafter until such election, a supplemental itemized statement. Each of said statements shall conform to the requirements of the following sections of this act, except that the supplemental statement herein required need not contain any item of which publicity is given in a previous statement. Each of said statements shall be full and complete, and shall be signed and sworn to by said treasurer.

"It shall also be the duty of said treasurer to file a similar statement with said clerk within thirty days after such election, such final statement shall be signed and sworn to by said treasurer and to conform to the requirements of the following section of this act. The statements so filed with the clerk of the House shall be preserved by him for fifteen months, and shall be a part of the public records of his office and shall be open to public inspection.

"Section 3. That the statements required by the preceding section of this act shall state: "First. The name and address of each person, firm, association or committee who or which has contributed, promised, loaned or advanced to such political committee, or to any officer, member or agent thereof, either in money or in kind, or more items, money or its equivalent of the aggregate amount or value of \$100 or more, and the amount or sum contributed, promised, loaned or advanced by each.

"Second. The aggregate sum contributed, promised, loaned or advanced to such political committee, or to any officer, member or agent thereof, in amounts of less than \$100.

"Third. The total sum of all contributions, promises, loans and advances received by such political committee or any officer, member or agent thereof.

"Fourth. The name and address of each person, firm, association or committee to whom such public records, committee or any officer, member or agent thereof, has distributed, disbursed, contributed, loaned, advanced or promised any sum of money or its equivalent of the amount of value of \$100 or more, stating the amount or sum distributed, disbursed, contributed, loaned, advanced or promised to each, and the purpose thereof.

"Fifth. The aggregate sum distributed, disbursed, contributed, loaned, advanced or promised by such political committee or any officer, member or agent thereof, where the amount or value of such distribution, disbursement, contribution, loan, advance or promise to any one person, firm, association or committee in one or more items is less than \$100.

"Sixth. The total sum disbursed, contributed, loaned, advanced or promised by such political committee or any officer, member or agent thereof, in amounts of less than \$100, in connection with such election in and pay from his own private funds for the purpose of influencing or controlling in two or more States, the results of an election at which Representatives to the Congress of the United States are elected, all necessary personal expenses for his traveling, for stationery and postage, and

for telegraph and telephone service without being subject to the provisions of this act."

Section 4. That section 8, as above amended, and sections 9 and 10 of said act be renumbered as sections 9, 10 and 11, and that a new section be inserted after section 7 of the said original act, to read as follows:

Section 8. The word 'candidate' as used in this section shall include all persons whose names are presented for nomination for Representative or Senator in the Congress of the United States at any primary election or nominating convention or for endorsement at any general or special election, as Representative in the Congress of the United States, shall, not less than ten nor more than fifteen days before the day of holding such primary election or nominating convention, and not less than ten nor more than fifteen days before the day of holding such general or special election at which Representatives are to be elected, file in the office of the clerk of the House of Representatives at Washington, D. C., with said clerk, an itemized detailed statement, and on each sixth day thereafter until such election, a supplemental itemized statement. Each of said statements shall conform to the requirements of the following sections of this act, except that the supplemental statement herein required need not contain any item of which publicity is given in a previous statement. Each of said statements shall be full and complete, and shall be signed and sworn to by said treasurer.

"Every such candidate shall include therein a statement of every promise or pledge made by him or by any one for him with his knowledge and consent or to whom he has given authority to make any such promise or pledge, before the completion of any such primary election or nominating convention or election by the Legislature or by the appointment or recommendation for appointment of any person to any position of trust, honor or profit, either in the county, State or nation, or in any political subdivision thereof, or in any private or corporate employment, for the purpose of procuring the support of such person or of any person in his candidacy, and if any such promise or pledge shall have been made the name or names the address or addresses and the occupation or occupations of the person or persons to whom such promise or pledge shall have been made shall be stated together with a description of the position relating to which such promise or pledge has been made. In the event that no such promise or pledge has been made by such candidate, that fact shall be distinctly stated.

"No candidate for Representative in Congress or for Senator of the United States shall promise any office or position to any person or to use his influence or to give his support to any person for any office or position for the purpose of procuring the support of such person, or of any person, in his candidacy, nor shall any candidate for Senator of the United States give, contribute, expend, use or promise any money or thing of value to assist in procuring the nomination or election of any particular candidate for the Legislature of the State in which he resides, but such candidate may, within the limitations and restrictions and subject to the requirements of this act, contribute to political committees having charge of the disbursement of campaign funds.

"No candidate for Representative in Congress or for Senator of the United States shall give, contribute, expend, use or promise, or cause to be given, contributed, expended, used or promised, in procuring his nomination and election, any sum, in the aggregate, in excess of the amount which he may lawfully give, contribute, expend or promise under the laws of the State in which he resides; provided, that no candidate for Representative in Congress shall give, contribute, expend, use or promise any sum, in the aggregate, exceeding \$5,000 in any campaign for his nomination and election; and the candidate for Senator of the United States shall give, contribute, expend, use or promise any sum, in the aggregate, exceeding \$10,000 in any campaign for his nomination and election. Provided further, that money expended by any such candidate to meet and discharge any indebtedness, fee or charge made or levied upon candidates by the laws of the State in which he resides, or for his necessary personal expenses, incurred for himself alone, for travel and subsistence, stationery and postage, writing or printing (other than in newspapers), and distributing leaflets, circulars, posters, and for telegraph and telephone service, shall not be regarded as an expenditure within the meaning of this section, and shall not be considered any part of the sum herein fixed as the limit of expense and need not be shown in the statements herein required to be filed.

"The statements herein required to be made and filed before the general election, or the election by the Legislature at which such candidate seeks election, need not contain items of which publicity is given in a previous statement, but the statement required to be made and filed after said general election or election by the Legislature shall, in addition to an itemized statement of all expenses not theretofore given publicity, contain a summary of all preceding statements.

"Any person, not then a candidate for Senator of the United States, who shall have given, contributed, expended, used or promised any money or thing of value to aid or assist in the nomination or election of any particular member of the Legislature of the State in which he resides, shall, if he thereafter becomes a candidate for Senator of the United States, be deemed to be a candidate for such office without becoming a candidate therefor, comply with all of the provisions of this section relative to candidates for such office, so far as the same may be applicable; and the statement herein required to be made, verified and filed after such election shall contain a full, true and itemized account of each and every gift, contribution, payment or promise whenever made, in any wise relating to the nomination or election of members of the Legislature of said State, or in any wise connected with or pertaining to his nomination and election of which publicity is not given in a previous statement.

"Every statement herein required shall be verified by the oath or affirmation of the candidate, taken before an officer authorized to administer oaths under the laws of the State in which he is a candidate, and shall be sworn to or affirmed by the candidate in the district in which he is a candidate for Representative, or the State in which he is a candidate for Senator in the Congress of the United States; provided, that if at the time of such primary election, nominating convention, general or special election, or election by the Legislature, said candidates shall be in attendance upon either House of Congress as a member thereof, he may at his election verify such statements before any officer authorized to administer oaths in the District of Columbia; provided further, that the depositing of any such statement in regular post-office, directed to the clerk of the House of Representatives or to the secretary of the Senate, as the case may be, duly stamped and registered within the time required herein shall be deemed a sufficient filing of any such statement under any of the provisions of this act.

"This act shall not be construed to annul or vitiate the laws of any State, not directly in conflict herewith, relating to the nomination or election of candidates for the offices herein named, or to exempt any such candidate from complying with such State laws."
