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ARMED MEN FAIL TO FIND FUGITIVE

Continue Vigorous Search for Assailant of Miss Miller.

BLOODHOUNDS ON CHASE Belief Is That Man Made Escape Before Attack Generally Was Heard Of.

Mathews, Va., September 21.—Although there has been no let-up in the vigorous search for the unknown assailant of Miss Ella Miller, the hunt for armed men who had been on his trail ever since the assault attempted on Tuesday afternoon seemed late this afternoon to be as far from locating the fugitive as they were immediately after the attack.

At daybreak to-day the hundreds of men who, worn out by their pursuit, which had continued a portion of Tuesday afternoon, all of that night, and throughout the greater part of Wednesday, temporarily gave up the chase at nightfall yesterday to snatch a few hours' needed rest, gathered again, and with renewed energy took up the pursuit.

The hounds were taken to the stretch of woods, where a man without a coat was seen to enter late yesterday afternoon and go to the taxicab from Richmond, reached Mathews shortly after midnight last night with three bloodhounds.

But the enraged men continued on through the thick undergrowth, scoffing every portion of the swampy region, being again doomed to disappointment, for no trace of the fugitive.

It now seems to be the opinion that immediately after the attack, and before the alarm had been generally given, and the countryside aroused, the assailant made good his escape, and that later he will be caught in some other section of the country.

At this afternoon, and disheartened by the many disappointments of the day, the men in the searching party decided to suspend temporarily their chase, so that all might get a good night's rest, and, refreshed, take up in the morning any new clues that may develop.

Miss Miller, although she is still suffering from the nervous strain which is bearing up very bravely, and is positive that she can identify her assailant if captured. Her mother has suffered complete prostration, following the shock of the attack.

The intense excitement which has prevailed in this section since the attack, has subsided somewhat, and the authorities believe they will be able to prevent any violent action on the part of the searching parties, but they realize that the promptest action will be necessary to prevent summary execution, and they are prepared to take every possible precaution to prevent a lynching.

"Although many of the Democrats had assisted in the support of the statutory tariff bill, the House at once began to make a record by passing three tariff bills—the wool bill, the free list bill and the cotton bill.

Wool Bill Figures. "The wool bill proposed a revenue duty of 20 per cent upon raw wool instead of 11 cents a pound, a reduction on raw wool, first class, of 25 per cent of the present duty, and an average duty of 50 per cent on woolen cloth and manufactures.

"A majority of the Insurgents and the Democrats in the Senate compromised on a bill which made the duty on raw wool, first class, 25 per cent; second class, 10 per cent, and the average duty on woolens, 55 per cent.

"This bill reduced the duty on woolens to an average of 49 per cent, with a duty on raw material wool of 25 per cent. The Wilson bill, passed in 1894, had reduced the duty to 50 per cent, with an average of 49 per cent.
