NO LIQUOR WILL BE SOLD AT FAIR

Petition for License Sent to Judge Withdrawn by Directors.

A petition signed by a majority of the board of directors of the Southside Agricultural Fair Association, was presented to Judge Mullen, of the Hustings Court, this afternoon, withdrawing the request that he grant a license for the sale of intoxicating liquors on the fair grounds during the holding of the fair, October 17 to 21, inclusive.

The board some time ago requested the judge to grant such license, but having been informed that there is considerable opposition to such license, and realizing that the fair is for the benefit of all the people of the community, the full of the opinion that there will be less excess in the use of intoxicating liquors by the granting of a license under proper restrictions, out of deference to the opinions and wishes of a goodly portion of our citizens, the request for the license is withdrawn.

When the request for a license was presented by the board of directors, Judge Mullen intimated that he would take the matter under favorable consideration, though the granting of such license was against his judgment. The withdrawal of the request by those who made it, however, is a whole matter, and no liquor will be sold on the fair grounds.







News of South Richmond

The family of Arthur Beville, of 327 Cowardin Avenue, who has not been seen since last Thursday, when he left home to attend a theatre in Richmond, has asked the police department to aid in the search.

Beville, who is a brakeman on the Atlantic Coast Line, is described by his wife as a man who seldom went out alone, and was a devoted father to his small child. He left home Thursday with a small amount of money, probably about \$20, and had a watch and chain valued at \$40. He was last seen at Seventh and Broad Streets with two men, and it is feared that he has met with foul play.

Anticipating a heavy enrolment at the Oak Grove public school when it opens for the new term October 2, the trustees of Manchester School District of Chesterfield county have added one more teacher to the staff, and have secured several rooms in the neighborhood to accommodate the overflow from the main building.

At the last term a great many children could not be admitted for lack of space, and a new school house was determined on. The site selected, after much effort to locate the centre of increasing population, has not yet been approved by Judge Watson, and until this is done nothing can be started towards the new structure.

Deaths of Infant. Horace, the seven-months-old infant of George L. Kunkin, died at his father's home, Step 4, Petersburg line at 11 A. M. Tuesday. The funeral at the home will be at 3 P. M. to-day. The interment will be at Maury Cemetery.

New Lights at Early Day. Those who have been complaining of the poor lighting in the city will almost certainly be turned on in about a week or ten days at the latest. Workmen are busily engaged installing the lamps on the poles, which have been in position for some time.

This morning at 9:30 the Democratic committee of Chesterfield county will meet at Chesterfield Courthouse for the purpose of counting the vote cast for the House of Delegates at the recent primary. This course became necessary because of the demand for a recount made by B. M. Bonivant, of Powhatan county, who was defeated by W. S. Ivey.

Business in Hustings Court. Judge Ernest H. Wells, in Hustings Court, Part 2, yesterday rendered a verdict in favor of the defendant in the case of William Isaacs Johnson, who had his case brought up on an appeal from the Ettrick Court. Johnson, who was charged with burying the body of a child without a license, showed that the grave was made near the corporate line, and he acted under the mistaken idea that it was in the county.

To-day Judge Wells will hear the case of Annie J. Goolsby against the Virginia Railway and Power Company. This is a case of personal injury. Mrs. Goolsby alleges in her complaint that through the negligence of the defendant company she was injured by slipping on an apple core lying on the running board of a car and was thrown violently to the ground, sustaining permanent injuries to the hip and spine and other minor hurts and bruises. She asks for damages to the sum of \$5,000. Orday Puller and Thomas W. Gardner will represent the plaintiff, and Willis C. Pulliam the defendant.

By permission of Judge Wells, the liquor license of C. J. Dobbin was yesterday transferred to D. W. Lowry. The bar is located at Fourth and Hill Streets, and will remain in the same location.
