CANNING FACTORY IS TOTAL LOSS

Completely Destroyed by Fire. Rain Greatly Needed in Northern Neck.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Lancaster, Va., October 1.—The canning factory of Thomas M. Wright, at Harding's Wharf, in the southern part of Northampton was completely destroyed by fire recently. The loss, including building, machinery and canned goods, amounted to about \$2,000, the insurance being \$3,000. The origin of the fire is unknown.

All the public primary and grammar schools in Lancaster will open tomorrow. The three high schools in the county opened two weeks ago all of them having an increased attendance over last year.

The Democrats of the Northern Neck are overwhelmingly opposed to the proposition to take the counties of the Northern Neck out of the First Congressional District and put them in the eighth.

In spite of the fact that this has been the driest year in this section within the memory of man, it is thought the corn crop will be larger than was at one time supposed. Many farmers will make an average crop, and in some favored localities, where rains were more frequent than in other places, the corn is unusually fine. The tomato crop, which is a considerable item in this section, has been a failure, and the canning factories have about completed their work for the season. The dry weather continues, and the late hay crop is threatened by the hot, dry weather, and in many places the water in the wells is getting very shallow, and some wells have gone dry. With the exception of four or five wells, each lasting not longer than half an hour, there has been no rain in this part of the Northern Neck since April. Unless rain comes in the next few days, the fall crop of high potatoes will be a failure, just as the early crop was.

CHECK FLASHED SOUGHT BY POLICE

He Successfully Swindles Alexandria Merchants Out of Small Amounts.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Alexandria, Va., October 1.—Successfully swindling two Alexandria grocers out of \$23.28, a dapper looking stranger about thirty-five years old, representing himself as C. E. Cox, superintendent of the Alexandria Chemical Company's plant, has left for parts unknown. The police have been asked to look up "Mr. Cox." The game worked by the stranger was a new one to his victims, who included J. C. Milburn, 113 North King Street, and William Rogers, 1202 King Street.

Before beginning his operations he learned that C. E. Cox is superintendent of the fertilizer factory in question, and had lived until recently at 916 Cameron Street, but now lives a Hoagmont, west of this city.

Accordingly he made the check to C. E. Cox. The check was drawn on the Broad Street Bank, of Richmond, and was signed "M. Levy." Above the name, printed with a rubber stamp, was "Richmond Insurance Company," and beneath Levy's name was the word "Agent," also printed with a rubber stamp. In the upper left-hand corner of the check, also printed with a rubber stamp, was the following: "Richmond Insurance Company, Mutual Building." The check in each instance was for the sum of \$20.

Entering the store of Mr. Milburn, the alleged Mr. Cox purchased groceries amounting to \$8.89 and tendered the check in payment. He was informed by Mr. Milburn that the latter was not in the habit of cashing checks for strangers. The man appeared slightly peaked over the announcement, although he waited for final action on the part of Mr. Milburn. The latter looked up the name in the city directory and ascertained that a C. E. Cox did live at 916 Cameron Street, and that he was superintendent of the fertilizer factory. He then cashed the check, and gave the stranger the necessary change, which was \$11.11.

The stranger, before departing, requested that the grocer see him to the house about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Complying with the request, Mr. Milburn's driver, going to the house, ascertained that Thomas Cook, local manager for Armour & Company, lived at the house, and Mr. Cook explained that no such check had been given. The driver, upon going to the home of Mr. Cox, in Belmont, also discovered that no such order had been given. Returning to Mr. Milburn with the groceries, Mr. Milburn realized that he had been swindled.

The stranger also pursued the same tactics at the grocery store of William Rogers, 1202 King Street, and, presenting the check for \$20, got \$12.17, after purchasing groceries amounting to \$7.88. Mr. Rogers also discovered that he had been swindled.

At the store of J. R. Mansfield, 517 King Street, Mr. Mansfield refused to cash the check after the man purchased a small stove and tendered a \$20 check in payment for it. He, however, directed the stranger to the bank next door and the man soon vanished.

Will Be Presented by North Carolina Sons of Revolution.

Raleigh, N. C., October 1.—The North Carolina Society, Sons of the Revolution, is preparing to present this year to the State, for place on the walls of the State House, the State House portrait of Governor Benjamin Smith. The presentation is to take place November 15, and the presentation will be by Professor C. C. Collier Cobb, of the University of North Carolina, a university man being chosen especially for the reason that Governor Smith was a special benefactor of the State university in addition to being an able Governor of the State.

Saturday Professor C. Schaub, of the United States Experiment Station, and in charge of the Boys' Corn Club work by the United States Department of Agriculture, had a party of twenty boys of Washington County here to be shown over the A. and M. College and given pointers in the matter of intensive corn culture and general improvement in farming methods. Mr. Schaub says there is a steady and very rapid increase in the State over improved methods of corn culture.

At the request of the county officials and the bar of Robeson county, Governor Kitchin has ordered a special term of court for the trial of all causes to convene October 1 and continue one week. Judge Whedbee is to preside.

DEATHS OF FOUR MEN WHOSE COMBINED AGE WAS 344 YEARS.

MAN FALLS OUT OF WAGON AND IS SERIOUSLY INJURED.


