

SLIGHT CHANGES IN DISTRICT LINES

Committee Reports Bill Affecting Only Fifth, Sixth and Ninth Districts.

THIRD REMAINS AS BEFORE

Halifax Goes to Fifth; Giles, Bland and Tazewell to Sixth.

As predicted in The Times-Dispatch at the conclusion of the hearings on the congressional redistricting bill last Friday, the only changes to be made in the district lines will be the taking of Halifax county from the Sixth District and placing it in the Fifth, and the taking of Giles, Bland and Tazewell from the Ninth and putting them in the Sixth.

The bill as reported apportions the districts as follows: First District—Accomac, Northampton, Lancaster, Richmond, Northumberland, Westmoreland, Gloucester, Middlesex, Mathews, Essex, King and Queen, Caroline, Spotsylvania, Elizabeth City, Warrenton, York, and the cities of Newport News, Fredericksburg and Hampton.

Second District—Princess Anne, Norfolk, Nansemond, Isle of Wight, Southampton, and the cities of Norfolk, Portsmouth and Suffolk.

Third District—Henrico, Gloucester, Chesterfield, New Kent, Hanover, King William, James City, Charles City, and the cities of Richmond and Williamsburg.

Fourth District—Prince George, Surry, Sussex, Dinwiddie, Greensville, Brunswick, Mecklenburg, Lunenburg, Kottoway, Amelia, Powhatan, Prince Edward, and the city of Petersburg.

CONVICT LABOR—II.

The action of the Senate Committee on Public Institutions and Education in adopting the report of the subcommittee in reference to the hiring of convicts would seem to indicate that the Legislature will not at this session do away with the contract labor system. It is true that the proposed plan of leasing not more than 500 prisoners for not more than five years is a considerable modification of the old method of hiring indefinite number on a twenty-year contract. The opponents of the old system will at least win a substantial, though not a sweeping, victory.

The arguments of those who contend that it will be to hire a certain number of the prisoners do not lack plausibility. It is pointed out that a large percentage of them are not available for service on the public roads, by reason of their not being sufficiently tractable to be hired as convicts.

The rolling stock bill being up, Judge Williams offered the amendment which he had presented in committee, providing that the distribution among the cities and counties should be in proportion which the railway property in each locality bears to the total value of all the railway property in the State.

Mr. Cox facilitated all the proceedings by moving the pending question. The amendment was agreed to, the bill engrossed as amended, and the constitutional readings dispensed with by a vote of 81 to 10.
