Roanoke, Va., June 10.—Griffin's Colts were given a sound drubbing by Pressly's Prides to-day, Roanoke winning by the rather one-sided score of 12 to 2. The Richmond club performed like second-class amateurs, and in comparison to the Roanoke team the visitors looked like rank bushers alongside of sure enough big leaguers. Nine errors were stacked up by the Colts, who were clawed thoroughly and effectively by the fighting Tigers.

Bruckmiller essayed to do the pitching for Richmond, and the former pride of Petersburg was slammed to all corners of the field by the hard-hitting Highland clan. His benders were straightened with ease, and he was given a good beating, Manager Griffin ignoring his obvious appeal for relief. Ehrd, who opposed him, scored an easy victory, keeping the ten hits garnered by the batsmen scattered and pulling out of holes with the same facility with which he worked himself into them. Jap was not in his best form, but good pitching was not required to beat the visitors, who beat themselves by their poor work on the defense.

Mike Shields was the bright, particular star of the contest, exhibiting in sensational style and hitting like a fend. He accepted eleven chances in the field like an Eddie Collins, taking part in two fast double plays that were pulled off by the Tiger infield. At the bat he landed for a three-bagger and a single, which helped on his team wonderfully, starting the batting rally in the third inning that broke the Richmond defense and resulted in a Roanoke victory. It is simply another illustration of the fact that what the people of Richmond want they will have, and they will spend small time accomplishing it. They are here, these business men of the greatest city in the South, and no obstacle can balk them. It would have been just as easy to get ten times \$10,000. Never in any campaign has there been such a unanimity of opinion in the city as exhibited in connection with keeping Richmond in a baseball league in which there are cities of the size and prestige of Richmond.

Never in Doubt. From the moment the mass-meeting which it may be called—was held last Friday night, no doubt has existed but that the money could be raised. It was simply a question of how much or how little time need be consumed in doing it. Then the workers got busy under the direction of Morgan R. Mills, and the result tells. Not a single man loafed. Each went at the task assigned hammer and anvil. However, ten those who have hustled most, as far as distance are all so-called. Morgan Mills, Field Gibson, and Field Wilton, will tell you that wasn't really hard work, but more of a pleasure. They were given warm welcomes wherever they went, and while some refused to take part, for financial reasons, on all sides words of encouragement were received. Just look over the list and see how representative it is.

One of the largest concerns in Richmond, now a stockholder in the Richmond Baseball Corporation, gave it as its opinion that Richmond could not afford to stay out of the league, if it were formed. The man who did the talking said that he for one wanted to see the city in the league, and that the Richmond's business men realized the importance of the organization from an advertising standpoint, and that Richmond was ready and willing to back any enterprise which would boost Richmond. "We are all eyes in Richmond, and we are going to stand by any enterprise which is helping the good cause along. Put us down for a share."

The point which appealed to all was that the local club would be controlled by a partnership between 100 of the business men of Richmond. It will be a manly-fathered child, this new bunch of locals, but it will be well fathered, for each of the men will see to it that the team get the support it deserves. Elaborate plans have been made for the return of the Rebels Thursday. A band will meet them at the station and escort them to the hotel. The same band will be at the park to make things merry. It will be opening day all over again, but much better opening day. Deacon Phillip and his leaders from the Smoky City will be the attraction and the season promises to do some of the flinging.

Improvements at the park will start with the price of admission. To the grandstand for men it will be the same, but the women will pay only 25 cents to the grandstand. The colored bleachers have been reduced to 15 cents. Already negotiations have been started to raise the fence to a height of twenty feet, and it is whispered that enough land can be secured to enlarge the park. The city will be at work again, and promises to have the Park in gala attire for the return of the pets. Word is expected from President Anderson telling of the reorganization of the United States League will really start its season.
