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

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NEW MAYOR OF FREDERICKSBURG AND FAMILY

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Fredericksburg, Va., June 22.—At the election in Fredericksburg, Va., on Tuesday, June 11, J. P. Rowe was elected Mayor of the city of Fredericksburg over Henry Warden by a majority. The total vote cast was 642. Mr. Rowe, one of the most enterprising and substantial citizens of Fredericksburg, was born here in 1855. He is the son of Mayor Abraham P. Rowe, who was Mayor from 1888 to 1900. He is a brother of Captain M. B. Rowe, pioneer Jersey cattle breeder of this section, with whom he is connected in business, and a brother of J. P. Rowe, manager of the Free Land and Daily Star newspapers, published in Fredericksburg. Mr. Rowe is popular and well known in this part of the State, and is hardly a man or woman in Fredericksburg who does not know him personally. He is also well known in Richmond, where he has many connections, he having married Miss Julia Cullen Tallaferra, daughter of the late William P. Tallaferra, of Church Hill, in 1887. Mr. Rowe's friends are justly proud of his having been elected to the highest office in the city, and they predict for him a successful administration.



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
