WILL IMPROVE WATER FRONT

City and Government Engineers to Confer on Harbor Work.

An inspection of harbor improvements at Richmond, planned for to-day, has been postponed on account of high water. Major E. E. Winslow, United States engineer in charge of river and harbor work in this district, will come to Richmond as soon as local conditions are favorable to consult Colonel J. B. Yonge, the local engineer in charge of government work in the James River, where about \$150,000 is to be expended under government supervision in improvement of the channel and creation of a turning basin for ships in the harbor at Richmond.

The Chairman George W. Rogers, of the James River Improvement Committee of the Richmond City Council, has written Major Winslow asking for a conference when he comes to Richmond in an effort to correlate the work the city is doing with the government plans. The city is just completing a wooden wharf along the river front from the mouth of Gillies Creek to the foot of Nicholson Street. In front of a portion of this stretch there is a small rock ledge, which might prove an obstruction to larger vessels in coming up to the new wharf, and the Richmond City Council has appropriated \$6,000 for the removal of the rock, too large and solid for removal by the city dredge. No bids have been received by the city for removal of the rock, contractors reporting that it would not pay to bring expensive equipment here for so small a contract. The P. Sanford Ross Company, which has before done work for the city, and which now has the government contract for the turning basin, has expressed interest in doing the work with the plant it has in the James River, provided the consent of the government engineers in charge of its present contract can be obtained. Mr. Rogers is assured that Major Winslow and Colonel Yonge will meet the city on such a proposal, and as soon as the work is back in its normal bounds a conference and inspection tour will be arranged, at which City Engineer Bolling and representatives of the P. Sanford Ross Company will be present.

INTERESTING SCIENTIFIC PAPERS READ BY DR. WATSON

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Charlotteville, Va., September 24.—At the first meeting of the Philosophical Society at the University of Virginia, Dr. Thomas L. Watson, head of the department of geology, read two interesting scientific papers. One of them will be published by the American Journal of Science.

Professor Watson discussed experiments with a substance resembling the point of view of its effect in giving strength to steel rails. He said there are four deposits of commercial rutile in the world. One is in Virginia, which are the others are in Norway, on the southeast coast of Norway, and the fourth is about thirty miles west of Adelaide, Australia. Of these, said Dr. Watson, the deposits in the State of Virginia are the most valuable.

Dr. Watson, who was chosen chairman of the section, succeeding Dr. Watson, and Professor William A. Kepner was elected secretary. Professor William Holding Echols was elected chairman of the editorial board, the other members being Dr. Watson and Professor John Lloyd Newcomb.

The couples were Dennis W. Tallister, of Roanoke, and Miss Ora E. Echols, of Floyd County; Thomas H. Powell, of Roanoke, and Miss Eva Z. Wickham, of Christiansburg; Noah Richards and Miss Iva E. Epp, of Floyd County; and George E. Coburn, of Wise County.

INTEREST IS FELT IN IDENTITY OF AUTHOR

"Reminiscences Concerning Napoleon III." by Baron d'Ambes.

BY LA MARQUISE DE FONTENOY. NOW THAT the "Reminiscences Concerning Napoleon III." by Baron d'Ambes has been translated into English, and have received so much publicity in the American press, the interest in the mystery prevailing as to the identity of the baron, has been revived.

It is admitted that the name of Baron d'Ambes is fictitious. Inasmuch as the author claims to have known Napoleon III. from childhood, and to have been with him at Arenberg, in Switzerland, a claim substantiated by descriptions of incidents of Napoleon III's early youth there, manifestly told by an eye-witness, the identity of the author of the book is narrowed down. For Napoleon III. in his boyhood and early youth had but few playmates at Arenberg. In fact, the names of every one of them were well known. They were Prince Charles Anthony of Hohenzollern, whose mother had been a Princess Antoinette Murat, and a most intimate friend of Queen Hortense, his sister, Amelia, who was the Princess of Saxe-Altenburg, and the two children of Napoleon III's wet-nurse, namely, Hortense and Eugene Lacroix. The Lacroix's mother remained a member of Queen Hortense's household until the latter's death, and her two children, her boy and girl, were brought up entirely with the future Emperor of the French at Arenberg as his foster-son and sister.

Eugene became a wonderfully clever architect, while Hortense, the Lacroix, who was also a Godchild of Queen Hortense, married Sebastian Cornu the painter, and continued throughout her life and that of her husband, a friend and adviser, her influence being all the more powerful in that it was ignored by the general public, and by some of the leading statesmen and by some of the Napoleonic war, Hortense Cornu always remaining in the background.

It is a matter of common belief that King Charles of Rumania, owed the nomination to his throne at Bucharest in 1866 to Prussia. But this is not the case. His candidature was initiated by Emperor Napoleon, at the instance of Mme. Cornu, who when Napoleon discussed with her as to who would be a suitable ruler of Rumania, suggested the name of Charles of Hohenzollern-Sigmaringen, as being the son of their former playmate at Arenberg, Charles Anthony of Hohenzollern. It was she, again, who suggested the candidature of another son of Charles Anthony, namely, the late Prince Leopold of Hohenzollern, at the vacant throne of Spain in 1870. This candidature was initiated by Napoleon, who was subsequently compelled to withdraw owing to the popular outcry raised in France against a Hohenzollern becoming King of Spain. Indeed, Napoleon was later on driven by his subjects to declare war upon Germany, because the King of Prussia refused to accept the candidature of another son of Charles Anthony, namely, the late Prince Leopold of Hohenzollern, at the vacant throne of Spain in 1870. This candidature was initiated by Napoleon, who was subsequently compelled to withdraw owing to the popular outcry raised in France against a Hohenzollern becoming King of Spain.
