Pittsburgh, November 30.—William C. Carnegie, eldest son of Mrs. Thomas Morrison Carnegie and nephew of Andrew Carnegie, was married today to Miss Ada Bell. The ceremony was performed by Squire John J. Sweeney at the latter's office in Eighth Street. The witness was Constable Jimmie Boyle.

The Carnegie family professes to know nothing of the affair and never heard of the bride. The indifference of the relatives did not disturb "Bill," as Carnegie is familiarly known in Pittsburgh. He just smiled when it was mentioned.

Bride and groom left the "Squire's" office and were found at a five-room flat, No. 1115 Palo Alto Street, Northside, the home of Mrs. Joe Dewar. Bell, mother of Thomas Bell, Thomas Bell was a workingman. For years his daughter, now the wife of a millionaire, has worked at one thing or another in Pittsburgh. She is twenty-eight and Carnegie forty-five.

"Oh, we thought it had been hushed up," exclaimed Mrs. Carnegie, when a reporter called. The officiant "Bill" intimated that he had been deceived. He thought the clerk at the marriage license counter had been "hood," and the bride thought "Jim" Sweeney should have more respect for his friends than to talk about telling him he knew. But since it was known they might as well confess all.

"It's no romance," began Mrs. Carnegie. "No, it's no romance," broke in Carnegie. "You know I'm forty-five."

"We met at Mateo Hill, R. I., four years ago," added Carnegie.

WITNESS HELD FOR PERJURY

Fort Worth, Tex., November 30.—John Beal Sneed, with the aid of the criminal statutes of Texas, laid the foundation today for further action in his fight for acquittal on the charge of murder in connection with the death of A. G. Boyce, Sr., in Fort Worth last January.

While Sneed's trial was proceeding in the Criminal Court the grand jury returned an indictment against W. A. Weaver, a witness, on the charge of perjury. Weaver testified he was present in the lobby of the hotel where Boyce was killed, heard "some one" as he expressed it, apply an epithet as Sneed entered, and that the tragedy immediately followed. Other witnesses testified Weaver's story in his movements previous to the killing would have placed him on train en route to Wichita, Okla., his home at that time, in Fort Worth. Weaver was released on bond.

Arguments for the defense in Sneed's trial were completed today. The State followed with rebuttal arguments which will be resumed Monday morning.

WIFE IS HOPEFUL OF VINDICATION

Gibson paid her first visit to her husband in the county jail here this afternoon since she left town after the jury failed to set him free last Tuesday evening. "I do not know what will be done about that, but Mr. Gibson desires to be cleared of the charge against him and would welcome another trial. I know my husband is innocent, and knowing that I will never give up working for his freedom until he is a free man."

Hammerstein Asks Partial Release From Contract With Metropolitan Company.

New York, November 30.—Oscar Hammerstein is planning to get back into grand opera in this country. He made an announcement to that effect to-night and added that he would have an opera house running full blast a year from to-day, if a request is made of the board of directors of the Metropolitan Opera Company is granted.

Under the terms of the contract he made with the millionaire directors of the Metropolitan in March, 1910, Mr. Hammerstein cannot enter the grand opera field in this city, Philadelphia or other places where they have interests. Now, however, he seeks a partial release from that agreement, so that he can present opera solely in English and at popular prices, leaving the field of French, Italian and German offerings entirely to the men who paid him \$2,000,000 to retire and leave them in undisputed possession of the field two years ago.

SMITHERS ASKS DEPUTY TO RESIGN
