

KEENE DENIES HE SOLD PETER PAN

Great Horse Will Go Abroad to Race in Either England or France.

New York, December 5.—James K. Keene has not sold Peter Pan, and Frank Jay Gould said last night that he had not purchased the famous horse, as had been stated in a dispatch from Kentucky.

Mr. Keene said yesterday that there have been negotiations both from English and French breeders for Peter Pan, and he has not decided as to whether he will send him to England to race.

All the thoroughbreds above named will be shipped to London on the Atlantic transport steamship Minnewaska, which will leave here on Saturday.

Peter Pan's career was limited to two seasons—1904 and 1907. He was so large a colt that his best form could not be shown until he was a three-year-old.

Keene denied the report that he had sold Peter Pan to Frank Jay Gould, and said that he had not decided as to whether he will send him to England to race.

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
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Yale's New Football Captain

O'Neil rode 570 or 580 races, of which he won 135. He finished second on many times that he didn't bother to keep account of.

O'Neil has been the leading winning man of France for several years. In a race for the \$50,000 Eclipse stakes in England he rode Prince Palatine, and beat out Danny Maher on Steadfast, by a short head.
