SUFFRAGE BAND REDUCED TO SIX

But Lowering Clouds Do Not Daunt Spirit of Remaining Pilgrims.

Ossining, N. Y., December 17.—Lowering clouds with a hint of snow in the air did not daunt the spirit of the pilgrims of suffrage when they completed here late this afternoon the second day of their two weeks' journey to Albany, to carry a message to Governor Sulzer on his inauguration day.

And, thence they marched ten parades, laughingly quoted Miss Rosalie G. Jones, commander of the expedition when she halted in the public square here with her little band of suffragettes, now reduced to six, after a leisurely tramping from Irvington. School children cheered and men and women waved from windows all along the route of the days' march. Dusty and travel-stained, but refusing to confess to tired feeling or weary limbs, the pilgrims rested to-night at the home of a local sympathizer. Tomorrow, with Albany 130 miles away, they will tramp on to Peekskill, another day's journey.

PRACTICE ABANDONED

Prices of Butter Will No Longer Be Fixed Arbitrarily.

Elgin, December 17.—In the most exciting annual meeting in its history, the Elgin Board of Trade yesterday abolished the practice of seventeen years standing of arbitrarily fixing the price of butter by its quotation committee, and adopted a plan to have the board itself determine prices, based on actual sales.

The action came as the result of a suit recently filed by the government aiming at dissolution of the board. In its bill the government mentioned the quotation committee as one of the means used by the alleged "butter trust" to control prices.

Reorganization of the board and amendment of its rules was the culmination of a bitter fight for control of the organization waged for many years between the commission or selling interests and the producers. The commission has elected a board of five directors, abolished the "quotation committee" and made a number of important changes.

Among changes in the rules adopted in one lowering the quality standard of butter to score 92 points in summer and 90 points in winter. The present requirement is 92 points in the test throughout the year. Another change requires that all butter must be sold the same week in which it is made. Several departments of justice agents attended the meeting and took notes of the proceedings. James P. Younger, of Chicago, said:

"I think this action meets the objections made by the government in its suit for the dissolution of the board, and will result in lowering the cost of butter to the consumer."

Joseph Newman, a producer, said: "The change in the rules will not benefit the public in any way, so far as I can see. It deals a blow to the producer of butter and gives the fixing of prices to the commission."

WILSON WILL APPOINT SUCCESSOR TO REID

Ambassadorship Is Highest Gift in Hands of New President.

Washington, December 17.—Who is going to succeed Whitelaw Reid as ambassador to the court of St. James? That is the question which has relegated everything else to the rear here. It is said, and the appointment would be more than pleasing to the new administration head.

If the South is to be drawn upon, it will be well to keep an eye on both the Georgia Senators and Tucker and Montague of Virginia. They have already been set down for something, and it may be that one of them may be called upon to serve his country abroad.

It became practically certain some time ago that either Tucker or Montague, or possibly both, were slated for high places in the Wilson administration, and although Governor Wilson said nothing bearing on the matter, there are certain signs that showing which way the political wind is blowing.

With either Governor Montague or Harry Tucker placed in the ambassadorial field, the race would be an open one for other Virginians with a hunger for a taste of White House pie. Of course, it is not certain that Virginia will be so fortunate as to get the highest appointment in the gift of the new President, but it is just as likely as not to turn out that way.

ALL WANT NEW MONEY

HAMMOND BUYS BONAPARTE HOME

Will Rebuild and Restore Magnificent Chateau at Bordentown, N. J.

Bordentown, N. J., December 17.—The 200-acre estate here which was once the home of Joseph Bonaparte, brother of Napoleon and former King of Spain, is to be restored and its magnificent chateau rebuilt by Harris Hammond, son of John Hays Hammond, who has just purchased the property. Among the most interesting details of the work of restoration will be the exploring and clearing of the three secret underground passages and subterranean rooms, on which Joseph spent \$200,000. In the expectation that the property would some day be used as a refuge for Napoleon.

It has been often reported about the countryside here that great quantities of gold and silver are concealed in treasure vaults reached through the devious tunnels which are supposed to give secret access from the chateau to the Delaware River.

Joseph Bonaparte was Napoleon's eldest brother. He accepted the throne of Naples in 1806 and was transferred in 1808 to the throne of Spain. The Spanish people obstinately resisted the domination of the Frenchman, and he was expelled in 1812. Two years later he emigrated to the United States and took up his residence at Bordentown, under the name of the Count de Survilliers. He went back to Europe in 1822 and died in Italy in 1834.
