into business under the parcel post is to buy the map, guide and entire parcel post outfit for 75 cents," said Mr. Harris. "This can be had by sending to Uncle Sam for it. In writing for the outfit the farmer should be sure to indicate his post-office. The outfit that will be sent will be designed for use in the particular unit in which the farmer lives. The outfit will show the farmer the rates throughout the United States from his farm house. The outfit is not now on sale at local post-offices and may not be put on sale at such places at all. All who want the outfit must send the order and the 75 cents to Chief Clerk, Post-office Department, Washington, D. C.

"Every farmer who embarks in business under the parcel post should have the outfit. The question of getting a parcel post rate, which is the cheapest rate of all, 5 cents for the first pound and 1 cent for each additional pound. Furthermore, the rules do not require packages wrapped in securely as for the second and other zones. Your rural carrier can guide you as to this.

Doctor: "I have a very bad case of catarrh of the head, and my stomach, bowels and blood are affected. I suffer greatly and would like a cure. A. G.—Local treatment should be used as follows: Get a 2 oz. of antiseptic Vishnu powder. Use a half teaspoonful to a pint of warm water; sniff the water from the palms of your hands; pour the water into the nostrils; then take a teaspoonful of Vishnu powder with one ounce of vaseline or lard and apply to the nostrils 3 or 4 times daily of the following: Syrup sarsaparilla, comp., 4 oz.; comp. fluid balsamwood, 1 oz. Give 10 to 15 drops in water an hour before each meal. Adv. eat, buckwheat, 2 oz. Mix and shake well. Adv.
