FEET PROTEST, BUT HIKERS MARCH ON

Suffragettes Change Plans and Will Make Baltimore Entry To-Morrow.

Baltimore, Md., February 22.—General Jones's plumed band of suffragettes celebrated Washington's Birthday by walking eighteen miles—some good and some bad—but all on feet that protested. With her feet padded with cotton and bandaged with gauze, "General" Jones started with the pilgrims from Havre de Grace and hobbled over the long stretch of macadam, in the rain, to Baltimore, where they were met by the main body of the band in the midst of a terrific storm.

On their way from Havre de Grace to Churchville, where they lunched, the pilgrims passed through the picturesque hamlets of Dogtown, Howling Run and Constantinople. At Constantinople, Harvey Johnson appeared with a bass drum and cymbals strapped to his back, a set of pipes fastened under his arm and a tin of snare drum.

He struck up a weird combination of sounds which caused Lausanne, the suffragette leader, to remark that she was "a little yellow wagon, to bolt and run into a haystack in the middle of an adjoining field."

A Mrs. Biddle, of Philadelphia, said to a member of the well-known military family of that name, arrived in Baltimore to-night and joined the pilgrims. She refused to be interviewed, and will say nothing further than that her husband is opposed to her joining the cause.

"General" Jones will say nothing about the new member, and the other hikers refused to comment on her identity and then cease talking.

A hot, ill-smelling haze overhung the entire line of travel through the weather was as warm as late May. Several people, a hiker or so and a black snake, deposed from their hiding places by the untimely heat, accompanied the pilgrims on their weary march. A heavy shower of rain and sleet featured the entry of the pilgrims into Baltimore.

Scores of Baltimoreans will go out to Overlea to escort the pilgrims into the city. A number of the leaders of the suffragette movement will visit "General" Jones to-morrow.

Grows Tired of Hearing That He is Married.

DIAZ DETERMINED TO RESTORE PEACE

New Dictator of Mexico Will Try No Halfway Measures.

STAMP OUT REBELLION

He Gives First Interview Since He Was Released From Prison.

[Special to 'The Times-Dispatch'] Mexico City, February 22.—General Felix Diaz, avenger of his uncle, Porfirio, and the new dictator of Mexico, received the correspondent of 'The Times-Dispatch' to-night. The interview marked the first period of relaxation enjoyed by the general since he escaped from prison and opened his attack on the National Palace.

General Diaz shows the result of the tremendous strain of the bombardment. His face is thin and drawn and pale, and his eyes are slightly drooped. His eyes retain their fire of indomitable will, however, and his countenance is one of absolute fearlessness. His voice is gentle and well modulated. His manner is decisive, but exceedingly courteous.

"My ambition," he said, "is to see Mexico once more peaceful, prosperous and happy, as it was under my uncle. Especially do I wish the safety of foreign interests guaranteed and the capital coming for the development of the immense resources of the republic."

"To establish peace and put an end to the ruinous methods of Madero was the sole object of the revolution. That purpose will be carried out without pause until it has been accomplished."

"What will you do about the rebellious States?" he was asked.

"Already we have sent men there in large numbers to fully explain the situation and the object of the revolution, so that all may understand. We hope in this way to win them over without the necessity of using force."

"If, however," he continued, "gripping the arms of his chair and snapping out the words, 'they still persist in refusing to obey the government, we will use such energetic means as to put an end to the troubles forever."

"As for Zapatistas, bandits and outlaws of every description, there is only one way to deal with them—to pursue them relentlessly, terrorize them, kill all who resist, so saving the lives of thousands of others, bringing peace and safety to the country."

No Halfway Measures.

"There will be no halfway measures, no temporizing, no treating with them. They will be stamped out to the last man."

General Diaz said that his uncle would come back to Mexico, perhaps next month and certainly by April, to live once more in his beloved land. His coming would have no political object or significance, General Diaz said, but naturally his advice would be valuable because of his long experience and proven executive ability.

The attention of General Diaz was drawn to the expressed purpose of John Kenneth Turner to publish in a Mexican newspaper here a series of ten articles attacking the United States generally, and especially President Taft and Secretary Knox and General Wood, saying a plot had been formed in Washington to invade and steal Mexico, also attacking Ambassador Wilson and even Felix Diaz himself.

"Why, the man is an anarchist," said Diaz. "He could be better arrested and locked up. It is too dangerous to have him trying to stir up trouble and bad feeling between the Americans and Mexicans. This time I will take care of him."

Turner has won the dislike of Americans here by his writings, in which he was encouraged by Madero, whose scheme seemed to be to provoke insurrection, thus hoping to unite Mexico to oppose an invasion.

All fears that Madero will be executed may be set at rest for the present, on information coming from the high courts. Madero is to be confined in a safe place until the present excitement dies down and then have a fair trial on charges of murder and embezzlement of national funds. There was not one word left in the story when the new administration came in.

A private individual is now advancing funds to pay off the army. An offer of \$10,000,000 was made to-day to lend the government \$50,000,000 pesos immediately, and as much more as wanted later.

Ambassador Wilson is in thorough sympathy with the new regime, believing in the restoration of peace and the security of all foreign interests.

Toward the end it was almost impossible to get Ambassador Wilson to carry out ordinary diplomatic relations with Madero, who had become insufferably insulting in his attitude toward Americans.

Investigate Treasury.

What may be regarded as a speculative sanction for an investigation of the national treasury, with a view to determining its President, Madero's resignation for any shortage, is contained in a message to Congress to-day by the Foreign Minister, Francisco de la Barra.

The message was agreed upon by the cabinet and President de la Barra was instructed to prepare it. It was an outline of the policies of the new administration.

The message said that there should be an immediate investigation of the exact amount of money in the treasury. This is in direct line with the efforts of a group of deputies who believe that the Maderos looted the treasury and should be punished.

The revolutionary element, those who cherished ideals of democracy and liberty and for these fought, and died, find in the new government a disposition to be frank and firm and anxious to aid in the implementation of those principles which have for their object the betterment of the condition of the citizens.

The international situation, concludes the message, which may be considered delicate in some respects, though fortunately because of the firmness and justice with which the government always proceeds with its affairs and because of the cordial sentiments of friendship which the foreign governments have had and still have, on a basis of their relations with Mexico is assured compliance with the demands made after the revolution of 1910, as far as they can be realized and are just.

COMPLETES DRAFT OF REVENUE BILLS

Joint Finance Committee Will Introduce Measure During First Part of Week.

HOLDINGS IN A. & N. C. R. R. Status Will Be Investigated by Special Commission and Report Made to Legislature.

[Special to 'The Times-Dispatch'] Raleigh, N. C., February 22.—The Joint Finance Committee of the General Assembly, with Senator J. Cook and Representative R. R. Williams, chairman of each branch, has completed the draft of the new revenue and machinery bills that are to be introduced in both branches of the Legislature early next week, having placed the bills in the hands of the State printers for introduction in printed form.

In the meantime, members of the committee will make no statement of the provisions of the bills. An increase of at least \$350,000 in the State's revenue is aimed at by the bills, without raising tax levies on property, this meaning something like \$4,000,000 taxes instead of \$3,250,000 State taxes as at present.

Readjustment of the machinery of the State's revenues means counted on by the joint committee, especially in effective means of collecting revenue on incomes, inheritances, franchises and kindred sources. They count on \$100,000, instead of \$40,000, from incomes; \$100,000 from inheritances, instead of \$50,000, and \$150,000 from franchises, instead of \$51,000. Only fourteen more days remain for this session, and two of these will be Sundays, and the adjustment of the revenue and machinery bills will be the absorbing work for the remainder of the session.

It is conceded that there will be a special session next fall, and indications are that it will be decided to create a State tax commission, have a complete new property assessment in the meantime, and the pledge that no more taxes shall be raised under the new assessment this year than last, except as required to provide the six months' school terms now being provided.

The House passed a joint resolution offered to-day by a Joint Finance Committee for a special legislative commission to be named to investigate the status of the State's holdings in Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad and the offer of E. C. Duncan to purchase the stock at 75 per cent, and report to either an adjourned or special session or the next regular session of the Legislature. The resolution goes to the Senate for adoption.

The House passed on final reading the Kellum bill for the State to issue semi-annual \$2,000,000 State 4 per cent bonds to cover county 5 per cent bonds for road building, and the bill goes to the Senate.

The House passed the Kellum bill to regulate elections in Wilmington, a comprehensive corrupt practices act. Great numbers of public local calendar bills were passed.

The House will meet in joint session on Tuesday to elect trustees of the University of North Carolina.

The Senate has set the Torrens land title bill for special order on Tuesday night.

Senator Jones offered a resolution to-day in the sense of the General Assembly that the State School for the Blind be moved from its present site in Raleigh to lands either of the Agricultural and Mechanical College or the State Normal School.

He demanded that the resolution be put on immediate passage, charging that a bill to this end is being unreasonably held by the committee. Senators stated that the report of the committee would be forthcoming very soon, and therefore the consideration of the Jones resolution was not pressed.

DINNER IS GIVEN TO JUSTICE WHITE

Chief Justice White and Major Dooley were students together at Georgetown before the War between the States, when they went together in the army of the Confederacy.

Will Be Largest Ever Passed. Washington, February 22.—Work was begun to-day by the House Appropriations Committee on the general deficiency bill, the last appropriation measure of this session, and which probably will be the largest ever passed. It will total about \$2,000,000, of which \$5,000,000 is made necessary by the Sherwood pension law. Last year's bill carried \$7,000,000. Deficits of \$2,000,000 for pay and subsistence of the army will be provided for, and there will be an appropriation for the preliminary operation of the parcel post. The bill probably will be reported early next week.
