

VETERANS GATHER AT FISHER'S HILL

Annual Reunion of Confederates Crowd of Nearly 18,000 People.

CANDIDATES ARE PRESENT

Politics Mingles With Wartime Tales and Family Outings.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) Winchester, Va., August 2.—The annual reunion of Confederate veterans was held today on the battle grounds at Fisher's Hill, Shenandoah County, where men fought and died fifty years ago. In spite of the fact that the veterans are "crossing the river" more rapidly now than ever before, the attendance was a record-breaker, the crowd early this afternoon being estimated anywhere between 15,000 and 18,000 people.

During this week there had been considerable agitation of the matter pro and con. One of the Councilmen, not in attendance at the meeting at which it was voted by four to three in favor of carrying out the ordinance, introduced at the meeting Friday the ordinance which was adopted over the stringent law. The Council, composed of eight members, was equally divided on the matter of a closed Sunday leaving the decision to the Mayor, who voted for the new ordinance.

That the Council will remain equally divided on the subject is very evident, and with all members present, the deciding vote will be with the Mayor. Several automobile parties were stranded here last Sunday, and had to remain over until Monday because the dealers declined to sell. Public opinion in the matter is divided. Those favoring the new law do not believe in an open Sunday, but believe there are circumstances which warrant the sale of certain articles on that day.

BLOW TO SMOKERS

Only Permitted on Old-Fashioned Open Cars in New York City. New York, August 2.—Smoking on all types of cars in New York, except the old-style open cars used in summer, has been prohibited today by the Public Service Commission. The order also prohibits smoking or carrying lighted pipes, cigars, cigarettes or pipes on station platforms, stairways, waiting-rooms and car barns of all traction lines in New York City. For some months past an antismoking crusade has been waged by certain societies and individuals.
