sovereigns with him. They never feel quite sure whether or not he will charm their monarchs into agreements, pledges and concessions detrimental in their eyes to the interests of their nation. At St. Petersburg and at Rome, sentiments of this nature prevail, and on each occasion when Czar Nicholas is brought into contact with the Kaiser, there are misgivings on the banks of the Neva, which have sometimes been justified.

It is this remarkable gift of William in being able to fascinate those whose good will and liking he desires to attract that undoubtedly led King Constantine to make so terribly indiscreet a speech during his recent visit to Berlin: a speech which has excited deep resentment in France, and what is still more serious for him, intense irritation in Greece, where his utterances have been repudiated in a manner extremely humiliating to him, by his masterful Prime Minister Venizelos, by his leading statesmen, by the principal commanders of the army, by the press, and by politicians of every shade.

Moved by the Kaiser's praise of his victories, in the presence of the assembled commanders of the German army, King Constantine seems to have lost his head. For he deliberately sacrificed the successes won by his army to the teachings and training that his officers had received in Germany and from German instructors.

Now, every one knows that the reorganization and instruction of the Greek army during the last three or four years has been exclusively due to the French General Eydoux, and to his large delegation of French officers of every arm, who had been loaned by the War Department at Paris to Greece for the purpose, at the request of the late King George. The splendid showing of the Greek army has been wholly attributable to the good work accomplished by these French officers in the way of training, drill, organization, and rearmament. The Greek army and the Greek nation thoroughly realize and acknowledge this, and are extremely grateful to the French officers for having thus enabled them to repair the disastrous and humiliating defeats which they sustained during the war with Turkey some seventeen years ago.

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The German officers who trained the Turkish army, under the direction of the Prussian Field Marshal Von der Goltz, could not afford to be so exacting, either in the training of the Ottoman officers, or in passing the quality of the war material supplies to the Sublime Porte by the Krupp and other great German concerns of the same kind. Not only the German instructors, but even the German embassy at Stamboul, found it politic to refrain from giving any offense to the firms in question, which possess such overwhelming influence at Berlin. Nor would the Kaiser's embassy on the Bosphorus permit the instructors to interfere with its diplomatic work by laying bare the dishonesty and corruption of the principal Pashas and statesmen at the court of the Sultan.

The Institute of France has now opened to the public the new "Jacques-Martin-Andre" Museum, on the Boulevard Haussmann, in Paris; and, crowded as it is with wonderful treasures of art, it may be commended to those from the New World visiting the French metropolis. The Institute of France has come in for an immense amount of criticism, both in France and abroad, for accepting the bequest of the late Mme. Andre's possessions, even though the public has benefited thereby. Mme. Andre left the whole of her vast property, including her mansion in Paris and her chateau and estates, comprising Ermenonville, to the Institute of France. It was generally expected that, notwithstanding the value, artistic, historic and monetary, of the property, the bequest would have been refused, owing to the unsavory character and reputation of the testatrix. That the Institute of France should have accepted it was regarded as inconsistent with its dignity.


The natural daughter of an engraver of the name of Jacquemart, and of an American saleswoman, her name was associated with that of many notable men of the Second Empire, and of the first decades of the present republic, until she finally enslaved and secured the hand of the late Edouard Andre, a hereditary partner of the great Protestant banking house of Andre, in Paris. He broke wholly away from the strict-laced traditions of his family when he married Volto Jacquemart; while the role of the woman was made

beyond belief. The Chateau of Ermenonville, which includes the tomb of Jean Jacques Rousseau, was built on the site of an older chateau by the Marquis de Girardin, who laid out the grounds in the style of an English park. He was Rousseau's last and best friend, and it was at Ermenonville that Rousseau found refuge in his last days and where he died.

Mme. Andre was ostracized by every one, save those who had something to obtain from her, not only on account of her antecedents, but also because of her misbehavior, both as regards morals and manners. Her arrogance, after Andre's death had made her one of the richest women in France, was altogether intolerable, and the affronts to which she subjected persons unscrupulous or foolish enough to accept her hospitality were almost
