

## MUNICIPAL CLUB HOUSE PROPOSED

The Richmond Amateur Athletic Federation, containing in its membership practically every organization in Richmond having any interest in athletics, will launch a movement in a few days for a municipal clubhouse to be built at Byrd Park. The need for such a structure will be at once apparent to all those who want to see young men and boys have a fair chance to fit themselves physically.

The most interesting part of the program will be requested to recommend to the Council Finance Committee an appropriation of \$20,000 for this purpose. In other progressive cities such clubhouses have already been built. The building, according to tentative plans suggested by those most interested, will contain baths, a plunge, clubrooms and other conveniences. At present there is no place for the youngsters to dress if they desire to take part in outdoor athletics. Trees and bushes furnish but scant shelter, and that of the most insecure kind, yet that is what they are forced to resort to.

The men behind the suggestion will get busy in a few days and believe that their efforts will be met with success.
