YELLOW JACKETS DEFEAT SPIDERS IN HARD BATTLE

Local Collegians Put Up Plucky Fight From Start to Finish.

FUMBLE PROVES COSTLY TO LOCALS

Attack of College Mows Sturdy Line From Ashland, but Punch Is Lacking at Crucial Moment. Clever Exhibition by Both Elevens--Straight Football Is Played.

In the fastest and hardest-fought game seen at Broad Street Park this season, the Randolph-Macon football eleven defeated Richmond College by the score of 14 to 7 yesterday.

So far as ground gaining is actually concerned, the Spiders covered considerably more space than their Ashland opponents. They found the line of the visitors particularly vulnerable, and by short, swift passes just off tackle, carried the oval within striking distance on numerous occasions, to lose it when the punch was lacking to take it across the line.

This much was made evident: there is light in the Spider camp. They fought with grim determination, and though errors of judgment were made, there was apparent at all times a willingness to go and do something entirely lacking in the elevens representing the Red and Blue during past seasons. They know how to score, and when the championship games come around some real football will be given the bugs. King, Ancarrow, until he was injured, and Coburn bore the brunt of the attack.

The going was heavy, which mitigated against fast play. Both teams were handicapped because of the soft turf, the backs being unable to get away to quick starts or to work up any speed after starting. As to weight, there appeared no appreciable difference, though if there was a preponderance, it went to the Hanoverians. Both Coach Reiss and Coach Dobson have placed a premium on speed, and because of this, were unable to show their teams to advantage.

It was a corking good football game.


EPISCOPALIANS TROUNCE AUGUSTA

Spectacular Forward Pass in Last Three Minutes of Play.

CRACKERS PUT UP GAME STRUGGLE

Virginia Appears Heavier, but Is Unable to Do Much With Lighter Line--Captain McWhorter and Quarter Back Gooch Individual Stars. 10,000 See Struggle.

Atlanta, Ga., October 25.—The successful working of a forty-yard forward pass, with three minutes remaining to be played in the final quarter of the game, enabled the University of Virginia football team to win the game to-day from the University of Georgia by the score of 13 to 6.

Only the successful working of this pass saved the Virginia team from what many would have considered a victory for the Georgia team—a tie game. It was a long chance and Quarter Back Gooch seized the opportunity. The ball was in the centre of the field. He hurled it to White, the Virginia end, and McWhorter downed him with but three yards remaining to be gained, but three yards remaining to be gained. Ray was slammed over tackle for the touchdown and Carter kicked goal.

Virginia entered the game a 3 and 4 to 1 favorite in the betting locally by reason of the fact that the out-weighted Georgia sixteen pounds to the man and twenty pounds to the man in the line.

Yet several times throughout the game, the lighter Georgia forwards outplayed their heavier opponents, especially when their goal line was threatened. Four times Virginia had the ball inside of the Georgia's ten-yard line, only to be held or thrown for losses on four tries, and Georgia worked the ball out of danger.

Virginia's Showing Disappointing. The showing of the Virginia team was disappointing to their supporters and alumni here and to nonpartisan fans; they failed to show the class Young Nelson, captain of the team, at a team possessing such latent strength as they seem to show, they acted more like a prep school team than a college team.

But for his wonderful backing up of the line, the game would have been a draw. Nelson's play was magnificent at least three touchdowns. He nailed Virginia men repeatedly for losses, and was the most effective and tackled the fiercest when the ball was within the danger zone. His goal posts, which he also showed an astuteness through dodging that got back many a yard.

Laudes, Ray and Gillette and White played the best game for Virginia, aside from Gooch, the first two on the field.
