

COAL COMPANIES WIN THEIR CASE

Plea for Lower Rates Is Upheld by Interstate Commerce Commission.

INEQUALITY WAS CHARGED

Ruling Will Have Effect of Opening Up Another District.

Washington, D. C., March 30.—The Interstate Commerce Commission today ordered the Kanawha and Michigan, Chesapeake and Ohio, Seaboard Air Line, Southern, Atlantic Coast Line and Norfolk-Southern Railways to put effect rates for transportation of bituminous coal in carloads from stations in what is known as the Kanawha district, on the Kanawha and Michigan Railway, between Gauley Junction and Plymouth, W. Va., both inclusive, to Richmond, Petersburg, Clifton Forge, Covington, Alexandria and Danville, in Virginia, Washington, D. C., Greensboro, Durham, Winston-Salem, Monroe and Charlotte, in North Carolina, and a number of points in South Carolina, Georgia and Florida, as low as the rates on such coal contemporaneously in effect over their lines from stations on the Chesapeake and Ohio in the Kanawha district.

Opens Up Another Field.
This decision has the effect of opening up another coal region to the points above mentioned, through allowing the same rates on the Kanawha and Michigan district traversed by the Kanawha and Michigan as at present in effect on the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway. The Chesapeake and Ohio has been making a switching charge for transferring coal from the Kanawha and Michigan to its own lines, thereby giving an unfair advantage to shippers on its own line. "The policy of the Chesapeake and Ohio to restrict the movement of coal on its line to the benefit of coal originating on its own line held to be unjustified," the commission's report reads.

The complaints in this case were brought by six coal companies in the Kanawha district in West Virginia, located on the Kanawha and Michigan Railroad. The complaints contended at the hearing that the denial of the rates sought and the continuance of the inequality between the rates from the Kanawha and Michigan and the Chesapeake and Ohio having control of the Kanawha and Ohio through ownership of its stock, made the rate system practically, and the fact that the Kanawha and Michigan was operated much more in the interest of the Chesapeake and Ohio than in the interest of its own shippers.

The Kanawha coal district is divided by the Kanawha River. On the north side of the river is the Kanawha and Michigan, on the south side of the river is the Chesapeake and Ohio. The coal mines on the north side of the river are practically the same quality, used for the same purposes, and bring substantial the same price.

Prevents Competition.
The exclusion by the Chesapeake and Ohio, however, of its own system practically, and the fact that the Kanawha and Michigan was operated much more in the interest of the Chesapeake and Ohio than in the interest of its own shippers.

North Carolina cities, while charging only \$1.60 a ton from its own line, although the tracks are parallel and the distances the same, has prevented competition along the Atlantic seaboard by the coal dealers in the Kanawha and Michigan district, and prevented the Atlantic Coast consumers buying from any point but the Chesapeake and Ohio.

The commission states that the cost of transporting coal from points on the Kanawha and Michigan to Gauley Junction, which is the assembling point for shipments out of that region, is lower than the cost on the Chesapeake and Ohio in that region, so that the contentment of the Chesapeake and Ohio for higher rates on the Kanawha and Michigan points because of a two-lion haul is negligible.

THOUSANDS OF MEN WILL GO ON STRIKE

Will Lay Down Tools, Following Failure to Agree With Operators.

Columbus, O., March 30.—Nearly every coal mine in Ohio will shut down tomorrow, throwing more than 25,000 men out of work for an indefinite period. This announcement was made here to-night at the close of a meeting of coal operators of the Hooking Valley, Jackson County, Pomeroy, Crooksville and Zanesville coal fields in southern Ohio. The decision of the southern Ohio operators to close their mines is the same action as that taken by the Eastern Ohio operators at Cleveland on Saturday.

Walk Out To-Night.
Wheeling, W. Va., March 30.—All the 10,000 union coal miners of the Eastern Ohio district will walk out to-morrow night pending the negotiation of a new wage scale for the district to take effect on Saturday. Notices have been handed in by 125,000 additional miners who will quit work on Thursday.

Long Struggle Expected.
Leeds, England, March 30.—Thirty-shire pits laid down their tools to-day demanding the introduction of a minimum rate of wages. Notices have been handed in by 125,000 additional miners who will quit work on Thursday.

HART PAYS VISIT TO TWO SENATORS

Receives No Assurance That Nomination Will Be Confirmed.

JUDICIARY COMMITTEE MEETS

Washington, D. C., March 30.—John M. Hart, of Roanoke, recently nominated by President Wilson to be collector of internal revenue in the Western District of Virginia, spent to-day in Washington. With Congressman Carter Glass, who was the force behind Hart's nomination, he went to the Treasury Department and called on Secretary McAdoo and Internal Revenue Commissioner Osborne, thanking them for their efforts in bringing about his appointment.

The chairman gave no assurance to Hart that his nomination would be confirmed, and did not say whether his nomination would be reported.


