PETITIONS FOR SPECIAL ELECTION IN SEPTEMBER

At Into Circulation Throughout Southside Section by Anti-Saloon League.

CAD ENGINEER REQUESTED

Southside Wants Federal Supervision of Section of National Highway in That County—Members of Police Force Re-Elected.

Petersburg, Va., June 30.—Petitions requesting the Governor to order a special election on September 22 to elect the people to vote on the question of State-wide prohibition, have been put in circulation here by the Anti-Saloon League, and are being actively signed. They will be put in circulation throughout the Southside section. The Rev. J. Sidney Duke, it is stated, will have supervision of the work in the Southside, and will make his headquarters in Petersburg.

The National Highway.

The Board of Supervisors of Dinwiddie County met yesterday and decided to make application to the government Office of Public Roads for an order to supervise the maintenance of the section of the Washington-Atlanta highway embraced in Dinwiddie County. A meeting of the county board was also held yesterday at which it was decided to levy the road tax from 19 cents to 20 cents, in furtherance of the plan. D. H. Winslow, of the Office of Public Roads, F. H. Murray, of the Highway Commission, and Secretary W. M. Martin, of the Petersburg Chamber of Commerce, attended a meeting of the Board of Supervisors. Mr. Winslow stated that about 75 per cent of the counties along the route of the proposed highway had made application for the detail of an engineer. These counties represented more than 650 of the 900 miles of roadway which the Chamber of Commerce will place mile posts along the highway between Petersburg and the North Carolina line. Work on the highway is in progress in North Carolina, and will soon be commenced in the Counties of Dinwiddie, Brunswick and Mecklenburg.

Police Corps Intact.

At a meeting of the Board of Police Commissioners last night, the present officers and members of the police corps were nominated to succeed themselves for the new term, beginning July 1, a tribute to the efficiency and high standard of the corps. The officers nominated are: R. F. Ragland, chief; J. J. Donahoe, lieutenant; J. E. Titmus and E. Payne, sergeants. The action of the commissioners in retaining the corps entire is a hearty approval by the community. Chief Ragland has had long experience as head of the department and is universally recognized as a courteous and considerate officer, who has tact and wisdom in the conduct of his respective duties. The police corps of Petersburg in all respects compares favorably with that of any other city. The other officers of the corps have made a splendid record, as shown by the fact that the names of John J. Heelan, who have made themselves famous in their line of duty. Four new members were added to the corps under authority granted the Council.

SOUTH RICHMOND

J. C. NUNNALLY CLAIMS SOUTHSIDE SUPPORT

May Be Chosen to Succeed D. L. Toney in House of Delegates.

TWO BOYS ARE DISORDERLY

Police Round Up Quartet of Colored Men Charged With Shooting Crap. One Charged With Resisting Arrest.—Personal Mention.

Southside business men are quietly working to secure endorsements for J. C. Nunnally, who is a candidate to succeed D. L. Toney as a member of the House of Delegates from the city of Richmond. The City Democratic Committee is empowered by law to fill the vacancy, and may take up the matter at a meeting, which it is understood, will be held on Friday night.

The people of South Richmond take the view that a member of the Southside should be nominated for the position. Before consolidation, Manchester had one, and sometimes two members of the lower branch of the General Assembly, and the voters of the city, in the last election, took the view that the Southside was entitled to representation, and Mr. Toney was elected.

Mr. Nunnally, whose name is mentioned, is an attorney, and has had considerable experience in public affairs. He is familiar with legislative work, through his connection with the General Assembly as committee clerk. He takes a prominent part in the social and fraternal life of the community, and has a host of friends on both sides of the river. Ward Superintendent J. T. Bethel is strong for his candidacy, and it is expected that Messrs. Washington and Morris, the remaining Southside members of the City Democratic Committee, will favor the nomination of a South Richmond man. The Madison County delegation as a whole will probably line up with the man selected by the Southside members.
