POLITICAL BOSS' IS HELD FOR GRAND JURY ACTION

William V. Cleary, Who Killed His Defenseless Son-in-Law, Waives Examination.

Haverstraw, N. Y., July 27.—William V. Cleary, political boss of Rockland County, was arraigned here today before Justice of the Peace Michael McCabe on the charge of murdering his eighteen-year-old son-in-law, Eugene Keenan, hanged in on all sides by his boon companions and devoted political lieutenants, Cleary, through his lawyer, Frank Comisky, of Nyack, waived examination, and was taken back to the county jail in New York City, where he is held without bail pending the action of the grand jury in September.

NEGRO WOMAN FOUND STARVING IN CLOSET

Tied Hand and Foot and Horribly Emaciated, Virginia Robinson May Not Recover.

NO MOTIVE HAS BEEN FOUND

Woman Lived With Ten-Year-Old Grandson, Who Has Told Neighbors for Several Days That His Grandmother Was Unwell.

Tied hand and foot with her nude body horribly emaciated as a result of a week's starvation, Virginia Robinson, colored, between fifty-five and sixty years of age, was discovered in a closet in her room at 2 East Federal Street yesterday afternoon.

Ambulance Surgeon Gorman was immediately summoned and found the woman in a state which weakened her. She was unable to speak or to move, and the surgeons at the colored City Home, to which she was rushed, held out but little hope for her recovery.

According to persons living in the neighborhood, the old woman and the boy have been living together. Last Tuesday it was noticed that she had not spoken a word since the previous week, when she still failed to appear, inquiries were made. The grand jury made the statement that she was sick, and nothing further was thought of the matter in a fortnight.

ARMS AND FEET FOUND TIGHTLY TIED WITH CORDS

Opening the door of a closet, he saw her form huddled against the wall. The arms were tied across the breast with cord, and there was another cord about her ankles. Every vestige of clothing had been stripped from her body, and she lay inert, her heart beating faintly and occasionally a low moan escaping her lips.

In speaking of the case last night, Dr. Gorman said that he had been far from unable to determine if the woman had been drugged. He did not think that she had been struck on the head, as he was unable to discover any evidence which would lead to this belief. However, the surgeon said that not a mouthful of food had passed her lips in many days, and that this fact accounted for her condition.

BODY IDENTIFIED

Mrs. Job Stuart Johnson Says Man Killed by Train was Her Husband.

The body of the man who was so seriously injured when run over by a train at the Washington Street crossing several days ago that he died in the Memorial Hospital, was yesterday identified by Mrs. Job Stuart Johnson, of 45 McKenrick Street, Petersburg, as that of her husband, Mr. Job Stuart Johnson, who she said was in Richmond about a week, and that after being in the city for several days he had succeeded in obtaining employment with the railroad company. She said that the first intimation she had of his death was from the description of the clothes given in the papers. He had been boarding with Mrs. Bridgeman, 2009 Spruce Street, since coming to Richmond. Johnson was a tinner by trade, and was forty-eight years of age.

EAKLEY FINED

Former Sailor Still Wears Uniform of United States Navy.

Edwin H. Eakley, Jr., one of the former sailors of the United States Navy, whose arrest several days ago caused a break in the diplomatic relations between officers of the navy and the city officials, was fined \$50 yesterday in Police Court again yesterday morning. This time he was charged by Patrolman Waters with being disorderly and was fined \$5 and costs. He is said to have been drunk and to have been in a belligerent mood when advised by the officer to go home. Eakley was wearing a sailor's uniform, but Lieutenant Parsons, in charge of the navy recruiting station in Richmond, said that there was no law under which a discharged sailor might be prosecuted for wearing the uniform after his dismissal from the service.

The delegates appointed by Provisional President Carranza to the Saltillo peace conference left Mexico City to-day, and there is every indication, according to State Department advisers, that the conference will be successful.

The fire is supposed to have started from the engine of the machine and spread over the hood, catching the canvas top and burning it badly. William Allen, another negro, was arrested later in the night, charged with the crime. Roach was able to walk to his home after being treated by Dr. Gorman.

From her parents-in-law, Nicholas W. and Mrs. Hall, and a negro servant had left the store, he was discovered in it again, and was promptly extinguished by men who had been watching the place. It was said that Mrs. Hall was the last to leave the store. The grand jury was still in session when information of the second attempt to burn down the Hall store came, and an indictment was immediately drawn up, charging Mrs. Hall with the murder of her husband, and a warrant for her arrest was issued by Judge Shackelford. Mrs. Hall was arrested by Sheriff A. M. Wash and brought to the courthouse in an automobile and arraigned before Judge Shackelford, sitting as a trial magistrate. She was placed in custody of Sheriff Wash and Deputy Sheriff R. E. Trice, and spent the night in the Louisa Hotel on the next day. She was admitted to bail in the sum of \$5,000. The bond was signed by herself, her parents-in-law, W. R. Roberts, a friend and R. Lindsey Gordon. The bond carried the proviso that she leave the county until her trial, returning only when it was necessary to consult with her counsel. The trial was set for July 14. On May 17 Mrs. Hall went to Richmond, where she was the guest of her aunt, Mrs. Venable Street, from Richmond, who afterwards went to Buckingham County. A few days ago the bar against her return to Louisa was lifted by Judge Shackelford, and she has been here since in conference with her attorney.

FALLS FROM BUGGY

Twelve-Year-Old Girl Suffers Severe Scalp Wound While Out Driving. Lucy Atkins, of 2009 Beverly Street, fell from a buggy in which she was driving with her father at Roland and Main Streets shortly after 3 o'clock last night and suffered a scalp wound in which Dr. S. H. Moon was forced to take three stitches.

No explanation as to why the girl fell from the buggy could be secured last night, but it is supposed that she was taken with an attack of vertigo. In falling her head struck the iron top of the buggy and she was knocked unconscious. Lucy, who is but twelve years old, was taken into the offices of Dr. Moon, which are near Roland and Main Streets, and was given emergency treatment. Dr. Moon thought at first that it was probable that her skull had been fractured and hurried her to Grace Hospital. The injury was found not to be as serious as was thought, however, and she was returned to her home several hours after the accident.

DIES FROM INHALING ILLUMINATING GAS

Eddie L. Young Passes Away Without Regaining Consciousness—Coroner Uncertain as to Cause.

Eddie L. Young, of 404 Hancock Street, who was found nearly asphyxiated in his room by members of the family on Sunday morning, died at the Virginia Hospital yesterday morning at 2:10 o'clock without having regained consciousness. Members of the family said there was no reason to believe that the young man committed suicide, and they are of the opinion that his death was due to an accident. Coroner Taylor said that his death was apparently due to inhaling illuminating gas, but that whether it was intentional or an accident was uncertain.

The funeral will take place this morning at 10 o'clock from the home of Mrs. J. M. Porter, 404 Hancock Street, a sister of the young man. His mother, father, brother James and two sisters—Mrs. J. M. Porter and Mrs. C. E. Hall, of Wistar, Va.—survive him.

Young was discovered lying on his bed in the tightly closed room by members of the family, who went to call him when he failed to appear at breakfast on Sunday morning. He was unconscious, and Ambulance Surgeon Stern, who was hurriedly summoned, immediately rushed him to the Virginia Hospital.

Held for Charles City Authorities.

Eddie James, alias Eddie Greene, colored, was arrested yesterday afternoon at Curly Creek farm by County Officer J. E. Shearer and remanded to the Henrico County Jail, where he will be held for the authorities of Charles City County. While attending a wedding in Charles City County, July 1, it is said that the negro had an altercation with Ned Cotman, colored, who was taking a prominent part in the nuptial event, and finally drew his knife across the back of Cotman, inflicting a deep gash several inches long. Cotman is reported as having recovered from his injury. James will probably be carried back to Charles City County to-day for trial.

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BULLET FIRED INTO CROWD

Robert Allen Struck in Right Side, and Is in Serious Condition. Robert Allen, colored, of 344 Gilmer Street, was hit in the right side by a bullet fired into a crowd of negroes by some unknown person last night. Ambulance Surgeon Gorman, who treated the injured man, said that the ball had probably penetrated the abdominal walls, passing in the direction of the liver. The shooting occurred near a blacksmith shop on Catherine Street, a short distance from the man's home. He was taken to the Colored City Home, where he was last night reported as being unimproved.

Fined for Resisting Officer.

W. H. Burton was fined \$25 and costs in the Police Court yesterday, when arraigned on a charge of disorderly conduct and with resisting Officer Gentry in the discharge of his duty. J. C. Collins, who was arrested by Gentry with the assistance of Patrolmen Tait and Talley at the same time, was dismissed.
