

**SOUTH RICHMOND CHESTERFIELD COUNTY TO REORGANIZE POLICE**

Will Have Chief and Three Officers, to Be Named by Judge R. G. Southall.

**SUBURB SEEKS IMPROVEMENTS**

Woodland Heights Citizens Will Hold Conference With Administrative Board—Preston E. Starke Dead, Revival Services Attract Many.

There is much speculation in South Richmond and Chesterfield County as to the appointments to be made to the police force of the county and city. Three officers and a chief of police are to be appointed by Judge Robert G. Southall on November 11 to serve in Chesterfield. Two policemen are to be selected by the Council for the new territory to be annexed, including Forest Hill, Woodland Heights and Swansboro. County Officer James H. Inman, who has been recommended to be retained by the city in Swansboro, took an examination on Friday afternoon. The Chesterfield Board of Supervisors recommended at its last meeting that instead of five officers at present, only two should be kept on the north side of the county and the south side. Officer A. T. Taylor was recommended to be made chief. Applications have been made by the other three members of the force—James H. Cousins, W. H. Flynn and Officer Bear.

**Will Meet Administrative Board.** Plans will be made this week for the meeting which will be held this month by the Woodland Heights Citizens' Association for the purpose of having the Administrative Board present to discuss the improvements wanted by the suburb. All of the citizens will be invited, and an interesting session is expected.

The suburb desires gas, water and police protection. As soon as arrangements can be made for their installation. Water pipes are already connected with the municipal plant, and all that will be necessary will be the formal transferring of the rights of the present Woodland Heights Company to the city.

**CHICAGO UNION STOCK YARDS PLACED UNDER QUARANTINE**

Secretary of Agriculture Takes Action to Prevent Spread of Foot and Mouth Disease of Cattle.

WASHINGTON, October 31.—To prevent spread of foot and mouth disease of cattle, the Secretary of Agriculture today quarantined the Chicago Union Stock Yards. Provisions of the quarantine, which is effective immediately, were thus explained in a statement by the department: "No cattle, sheep or swine can be moved from the stock yards in interstate or foreign commerce, except for the purpose of immediate slaughter, and under permits issued by Federal inspectors. In such cases, they must be transported in sealed cars placarded 'For immediate slaughter.'" "Foot and mouth disease is one of the most contagious infections known, and, if it were possible to move stock from the Chicago yards to the country for feeding or dairy purposes, there is grave danger that the disease might be disseminated over large areas. "Up to the present time, no cases of foot and mouth disease have been found in the Union Stock Yards, but there is some reason to believe that infected stock may have passed through."
