The Constitution thus adopted, was, by the act, to extend over the whole State, as fast as it was recovered to the people. Upon the capture of Lee's army, in April, 1865, this Constitution, it is claimed by its friends, became the law of the land.

In the winter of 1864-65, the Legislature elected Messrs. Seward and Underwood to the United States Senate, in place of Bowden, deceased, and Carlisle, who had expired.

Immediately after the Ordinance of Secession was declared adopted, a convention was called to meet at Wheeling on the 20th of June, 1862.

In the opening of 1864, by call of the Legislature, in session at Alexandria, and then representing, or claiming to represent, nine counties, the Convention met at Alexandria for the purpose of amending the Constitution of the State.
