### Death of a Veteran.

Washington, Dec. 18.—Gen. John G. Parke, retired, died at his residence here Sunday of a complication of diseases incident to old age. He leaves a widow, but no children. He had lived here a number of years. The interment will be in Philadelphia. Gen. Parke served with distinction during the civil war and later gained a fine reputation in the engineer corps. He was superintendent of the Military academy at West Point for two years.

### A Great Question.

### Ask for a Receiver.

### Commissioners Named.

Washington, Dec. 14.—President McKinley has reappointed Judson C. Clements, of Georgia, as interstate commerce commissioner, and has appointed John W. Yerkes, of Kentucky, commissioner of internal revenue.

### Breaks the Record.

Washington, Dec. 15.—The report of the director of the mint on the production of gold and silver in the United States during the calendar year 1899 shows a production of \$71,053,400 for gold and \$37,858,700 for silver at its average commercial value for the year. The gold product was the greatest in the history of the country.

### A Poison Mystery.

Marietta, O., Dec. 17.—As a result of a mysterious case of poisoning at Forsythe Mines, near here, four persons are dead, three are dying and two others are seriously ill. Jealousy is hinted as the motive for the crime. The dead are: Andrew Barsick, Mary Lelichak, Andrew Letehie, and a child, name not given.

### Loss Not So Great.

Madrid, Dec. 18.—An official dispatch from the prefect of Malaga shows the loss of life by the foundering on Sunday of the German training frigate Gneisenau off Malaga to be less than has been reported. According to this dispatch 35 fatalities resulted from the accident and 199 persons were injured.
