THE FLOOD IN TENNESSEE.

Fourteen Lives Known to Have Been Lost and Immense Damage to Property Done.

Knoxville, Tenn., May 24.—The Knoxville sequel to the terrific flood in upper East Tennessee and southwest Virginia is just being realized. Conservative estimates from upper East Tennessee place the dead actually found at 14. Speculation, however, exists as to the number that may be found dead after the water recedes.

Later details from the flood-stricken section show great damage done in western North Carolina mountains. Huntsdale, a new town at the southern terminus of the Tennessee division of the Ohio River & Charleston railway, is practically wiped out.

Charlotte, N. C., May 25.—Reports from remote counties in the mountain districts show great destruction by the storm. In Bakersville, 16 residences and the Baptist church were washed away. Quinter Moore and his son were drowned. Every house in Magnetic City, a village in Mitchell county, was destroyed. At Rann Mountain Station 20 residences were swept away. Six large stores on Big Rock creek were carried away and one man, John McKinney, drowned while an unknown man was killed by a landslide.

Charlotte, N. C., May 27.—A special from Raleigh to the Observer says: Gov. Aycock says all the low land crops on the state-penitentiary farm known as Calcedonia were destroyed in the recent floods. He says the flood damage in the state amounts to several million dollars.

DOWIE IS HELD.

With His Overseer and Two Zion Deaconesses Must Answer to Grand Jury for Death of Mrs. Judd.

Chicago, May 24.—Dowieism must answer to the law for the death of Mrs. Emma Lucy Judd. By the verdict of the coroner's jury John Alexander Dowie, H. Worthington Judd, husband of the victim, and two deaconesses of Zion are held to the Cook county grand jury on the charge they are criminally responsible for the death of this woman, whose life, with that of her infant, went out after 16 hours of suffering without medical relief.

Double Crime.

New York, May 25.—William Woodhull, a farmer residing at Laurel, L. I., shot and killed Martha Williamson, a neighbor, Thursday night, and then committed suicide. Just what led to the tragedy has not been made clear, but it is said that the woman gossiped a good deal about Woodhull and a young lady living at Sayville, to whom he was engaged.

Burned to Death.

Dubuque, Ia., May 28.—Henrietta Mottzinger, aged 71, was burned to a crisp in her home in Center township. The husband rescued some clothing and money, but on trying to return could not reach his wife. Her bones were found in the ashes of the house.

Civil Service Examinations.

Washington, May 28.—The annual report of the civil service commission shows that during the year ended June 30, 1900, 45,641 persons took the competitive examination for government appointments.

Census of Australia.

Melbourne, Australia, May 28.—The new census returns give the population of Australasia at 4,550,651. This is an increase of 740,758 since the last enumeration.

Bresel Kills Himself.

Rome, May 25.—Bresel, the assassin of the late King Humbert, who has been confined in the penitentiary at Santo Stefano, has committed suicide.

HOMeward BOUND.

President McKinley and Party Are En Route to Washington—Mrs. McKinley Stands Journey Well.

San Francisco, May 25.—President McKinley has completed his programme in this city, having met every organization included in the original schedule, and Mrs. McKinley's health has so far improved that the president and his party will begin the return journey to the national capital at ten a. m. to-day. The president's public functions Friday included a reception at the Scott residence to the members of the foreign consular representatives of this city. A reception at the Palace hotel by the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution and the Loyal Legion in honor of the president and a review of the school children of Oakland by the president. The president spent the evening quietly at the Scott residence resting and superintending arrangements for to-day's departure.

Ogden, Utah, May 27.—Mrs. McKinley is standing the homeward journey well. Her condition, indeed, is better than it was when the presidential party started from San Francisco. The train arrived here at 6:30 last night, and over 7,000 persons were at the depot to see the president. Gov. Wells was received by the president in the rear of the car. After a few moments Gov. Wells stepped to the platform and told the crowd on account of this being the Sabbath and the illness of Mrs. McKinley the president desired that there should be no demonstration or noise, and that he would make no speech.

Julesburg, Col., May 28.—The presidential train made the third day's run on the homeward journey without incident. The trip across Wyoming was enlivened by crowds at every station. Mrs. McKinley is standing the trip very well and seems rejoiced that every hour brings her nearer home.

TEACHERS FOR FILIPINOS.

President Taft Requests Secretary of War Root to Send Five Hundred Educators.

ONE-FIFTH OF THEM TO BE WOMEN.

Gen. Tinto Says Not a Single Rebel Remains in Northwestern Luzon—Aguinaldo Wants to Visit America to Study the Institutions—Other Notes from the Islands.

Manila, May 23.—Senor Dancel, an accredited intermediary, has returned here after having had a very satisfactory interview with the rebel commander, Gen. Calles, who has been declared an outlaw. Dancel says Calles is anxious to surrender, with his entire command, provided his men are liberated as soon as they take the oath of allegiance. Calles says that personally he is not afraid of an investigation of his various acts. He says that he never violated the laws of war, and that he always showed consideration for his prisoners.

Corbin Going to Philippines.

Washington, May 23.—Maj. Gen. Henry C. Corbin, adjutant general of the army, will sail for the Philippines on the transport Hancock, which leaves San Francisco June 25. He intends to make a general inspection of the military conditions in the islands.

Teachers Wanted.

Manila, May 24.—President Taft, of the Philippine commission, has called to Secretary of War Root, requesting him to send 500 of the appointed school-teachers, one-fifth of whom will be women. The question of securing transportation for them is a serious one. The transports have on an average only 60 staterooms, and it may therefore be necessary to charter steamers to bring the teachers here. Accommodations will be furnished the teachers in Manila until they are assigned to the provinces.

Surrender Was Complete.

Manila, May 24.—Gen. Tinto has arrived here. He will visit Gen. MacArthur in behalf of the Ilocos prisoners. He says that his surrender was most complete, not a single gun remaining in the northwestern part of Luzon. The men who were in arms are now engaged in trading. He added that the people want civil government and schools.

Spy Arrested.

Manila, May 24.—Karl Enkelsjon, a spy of the Filipino Hong-Kong junta, was arrested here with incriminating documents in his possession.

May Visit America.

Washington, May 25.—Mail advices received at the war department show that Aguinaldo will undoubtedly visit this country if he can obtain the approval of Gen. MacArthur. Aguinaldo's explanation is that he would like to study American institutions and the English language, with a view of benefiting his country on his return.

Will Return to Philippines.

New York, May 25.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Instead of being assigned to duty in the United States upon the expiration of their present leaves of absence, Brig. Gen. Fred D. Grant and Maj. Gen. J. C. Bates will return to their stations in the Philippines.

SENATORS RESIGN.

Messrs. Tillman and Mc Laurin Give Up Their Seats in the Senate from South Carolina.

Charleston, S. C., May 27.—The fierce political war between Senators Tillman and Mc Laurin reached a climax Saturday, when both sent to Gov. McSweeney their resignations as United States senators. Each announced that he will go before the primary for reelection. The resignations will take effect September 15.

This is the second instance in the history of the senate that two members of that body have resigned and appealed for vindication to the voters of their state. In 1881 Senators Conkling and Platt resigned from New York, and neither was re-elected.

Fatal Collision.

Albany, N. Y., May 27.—Two crowded electric cars racing toward each other for a switch while running at the rate of 40 miles an hour collided near Greenbush with terrific force. Five persons were killed and 40 injured, at least two fatally and others seriously. The passengers were pleasure seekers bound for various resorts and many of them were of rich and fashionable families.

An End to Hazing.

Washington, May 23.—Eleven cadets thrown out of the West Point (N. Y.) military academy, five never to return, and the six others suspended until April 1 next, and 72 more embryo officers sentenced to punishments less severe are the results of the recent insubordination or mutiny, and are expected to sound the death knell of hazing.

Gov. Nash Very Ill.

Columbus, O., May 27.—Gov. Nash has been advised by his physicians that three weeks of absolute rest will be necessary to restore him to health. He is still in a weakened condition as a result of his trip to the Pacific coast.

Great Yield of Gold.

Vancouver, B. C., May 27.—Passengers who arrived on the steamer Tees estimate the season's cleanup at Dawson at \$30,000,000.

Boer General Killed.

White Handling Lyddite Shell Kept as Curiosity It Explodes with Deadly Effect.

Pretoria, May 28.—The Boer Gen. Schoeman and his daughter have been killed, and his wife and two others have been badly injured by the explosion of a shell.

Gen. Schoeman, his family and some friends were examining a 4.7-inch lyddite shell, which they kept in the house as a curiosity, when the shell exploded, killing the general on the spot and mortally wounding his daughter, and severely injuring his wife and two other persons.

TO SEND SHAMROCK I.

Sir Lipton Will Have Old Challenger Continue Trial Races with New Boat on This Side.

Glasgow, May 28.—After consultation with Mr. Fife, Sir Thomas Lipton has decided to send Shamrock I. to America with the challenger in order that he may continue the trial races right up to the date of the cup races. This will cost an additional \$4,000, but Sir Thomas is confident that the advantage to be gained justifies the expense. Capt. Wringe will command the Shamrock I., with the same crew that has sailed her here this season.

Three Candidates Chosen.

Rome, May 28.—Three candidates have been chosen by the congregation of the propaganda for the rectorship of the American college here, vacant owing to the appointment, May 7, of Mgr. O'Connell to the bishopric of Portland, Me. The names are kept secret, but they include Rev. Dr. Thomas F. Kennedy, of Overbrook, Pa. Forecasts of the result are premature in June, and will then make a choice, which will require the confirmation of the pope.

Morocco Yields to France.

Paris, May 28.—The government of Morocco has agreed to give France full satisfaction for the murder of Paul Ponsard, the wealthy planter who, with his son-in-law, was murdered by pirates while on a shooting expedition off the Rif coast, in April last, at which time his two daughters were carried off. Morocco will also settle all pending questions affecting Algeria. A Moroccan minister has started for Tangier to see that the agreed conditions are carried out.

St. Louis World's Fair Commissioners.

Denver, Col., May 28.—Gov. Orman has appointed the following St. Louis world's fair commissioners: Capt. George W. Thatcher, of Aspen, Pitkin county, commissioner in chief; Thomas J. O'Donnell, of Denver, Arapahoe county; Van E. Rouse, of Colorado Springs; El Paso county; I. N. Stevens, of Colorado Springs, El Paso county, commissioners.

Sensational Murder.

London, May 28.—A sensational murder and case of mutilation has occurred in a low lodging house in Dorset street, Whitechapel, close to the scene of the "Jack the Ripper" murders of 1888. The victim, a woman named Annie Austin, 28 years old, was found lying in a bedroom on Sunday morning and was removed to a hospital, where she died.

Believed to Be Schooner Rand.

Racine, Wis., May 28.—There is a belief here that the vessel lost of Sheboygan during the storm is the schooner Rand, of Racine, commanded by Capt. Jefferson. The description of the wreck tallies with the Rand and no tidings have been received of the Rand since the storm.

An Appointment.

Springfield, Ill., May 28.—Gov. Yates has appointed C. V. Chandler of Macomb, trustee of the Illinois soldiers' and sailors' home, vice Samuel Bradley, of Quincy, declined. Gen. John C. Black, of Chicago, has withdrawn his declination and accepted the same position.

To Be Located at Buffalo.

Milwaukee, May 28.—Buffalo, N. Y., has been selected as the permanent headquarters of the United Switchmen of North America, and the Switchmen's Journal, now published at Omaha, will shortly be removed from that city to Buffalo.

Killed by Tramps.

Carrollton, Mo., May 28.—Charles McKinney, a son of Policeman McKinney, was shot and killed at two o'clock Tuesday morning while assisting his father to arrest a gang of tramps. Three of the gang were arrested and placed in jail.

Cowboy Shoots Two.

Cheyenne, Wyo., May 28.—During a shooting affray at Medicine Bow, Wyo., Dick England, a well-to-do sheepman of that place, was killed and Fred Mole was mortally wounded. A cowboy named Ambler did the shooting.

Illinois Sunday School Convention.

Bloomington, Ill., May 28.—The forty-third annual Illinois state Sunday school convention opened at the First Methodist church Tuesday. The attendance bids fair to be far the largest in the history of the association.

Extensive Fire.

Kindred, N. D., May 28.—Fire here early in the morning destroyed 22 buildings at a loss of \$100,000 with less than one-third insurance. Nearly all the buildings in three business blocks were burned.

To Meet Next in Chicago.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 28.—The International Association of Car Workers will hold their next convention in Chicago in October, 1902.
