PRESIDENT'S FAMILY

Six Members of New Cabinet Are Determined Upon.

REMAINING THREE IN DOUBT

Secretaries of Navy, Treasury and Interior Have Not Yet Publicly Stated Whether They Will Remain or Not—Attorney-General Moody Remains.

Washington, Nov. 22.—It has just been announced at the White House that Attorney-General Moody has decided to remain in President Roosevelt's new cabinet.

Prior to his transfer from the navy department to the department of justice Mr. Moody himself authorized the statement at the conclusion of the present administration he would retire to practice law in Boston. It was stated in this connection that Mr. Moody had formed a law partnership that was congenial and advantageous in all respects. This was given as his only reason for retiring from public life. It has been known for some time that the office of attorney-general of the United States was entirely to Mr. Moody's liking, and as it was known also that President Roosevelt desired that Mr. Moody should continue in the cabinet, the announcement made today was not surprising.

The decision of Attorney-General Moody renders it reasonably certain that the head of six of the great executive departments of the government have been determined on by the president for the next administration. Mr. Hay will continue at the head of the state department; Mr. Taft at the head of the war department; Mr. Metcalf at the head of the department of commerce and labor; Mr. Wilson at the head of the agricultural department, and National Chairman George B. Cortelyou will be postmaster-general after the fourth of next March.

It is expected also that Mr. Shaw will continue as secretary of the treasury and Mr. Morton as secretary of the navy, but as to those two no definite information is obtainable. A change is expected in the department of interior, but Secretary Hitchcock has not let it be known publicly whether he desires to retire or not.

NAN PATTERSON'S TRIAL.

Prosecution to Prove That Young's Murder Was Premeditated.

New York, Nov. 22.—The trial of Nan Patterson for the murder of Bookmaker "Caesar" Young was fairly begun before Justice Davis in the supreme court Monday, and when adjournment was taken at 4 o'clock Assistant District Attorney Rand had concluded his outline of the state's case and had examined several of the witnesses for the prosecution.

Mr. Rand said the state's witnesses would prove that Nan Patterson killed Young and that the killing was planned several hours before the morning on which Young met his death.

William J. Junior, the policeman who was first to reach the cab after the shooting, testified that Miss Patterson was hysterical and crying "Oh, Caesar, why did you do it?"

There was other interesting testimony, particularly that of Detective Edward Quinn, who took Miss Patterson from the hospital where Young died to the police station. He said the woman said to him: "I don't want to live now. Why should he have killed himself?" The officer said she fainted several times in the station house and that several times she asked him to kill her, as she had nothing to live for, now that "Caesar" was dead.

There was not an unusually large crowd in the court in the morning, but the main floor of the criminal courts building was a solid mass of people in the afternoon.

Washington, Nov. 22.—President Roosevelt has announced the appointment of Francis E. Leupp of this city to be Indian commissioner, vice William A. Jones, resigned. Commissioner Jones' resignation and Mr. Leupp's appointment will take effect on Jan. 1. Mr. Leupp is the Washington correspondent of the New York Evening Post and has been identified with Indian affairs for many years.

BOLD DECLARATION.

Zemstvo Makes It In Its Final Form of Address to Czar.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 22.—In order to secure the proper development of the life of the state and the people, it is imperatively necessary that there be regular participation of national representatives, sitting as an especially elected body, to make laws, regulate the revenue and expenditure and control the legality of the actions of the administration.

The above is the final form of the declaration of the zemstvo representatives in favor of the election of a body, not merely to participate in legislation as at first reported, but to be entrusted with the framing of the laws of the empire.

The meeting Monday also adopted a declaration in favor of granting general amnesty to political offenders imprisoned or exiled by administrative orders.

This completed program, declaring the necessity of the participation by the people in the government, was signed by 102 zemstvo presidents, including thirty presidents of provincial zemstvo committees out of thirty-two who attended the meeting.

This document, setting forth the necessity of reforms, is all the more striking and impressive because the zemstvo presidents who signed it, while elected by zemstvo organizations, are confirmed by the government. The signatories also included five marshals of the nobility, the elections to which offices are also confirmed by the government.

The memorial will be presented within a couple of days to the minister of the interior, Prince Sviatopolk Mirsky, by a delegation. The zemstvo meeting will now proceed with the discussion of the remainder of the program, which although it directly concerns zemstvo work, is of minor importance. It consists, first, of primary education; second, of the disorganization attendant on mobilization; third, relief measures for the families of those sent to war, and fourth, Red Cross work.

The meeting has been flooded with proclamations from radical organizations.


