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TEN MICHIGAN COUNTIES JOIN "DRY" FORCES

Four Out of Fourteen Counties Where The Anti-Saloon League Campaign Went "Wet"

Detroit, Mich., April 7.—Local option fights were largely responsible for a big vote in at least fourteen of the counties of Michigan Monday, where the question of closing the saloons was at an issue.

The "drys," while they did not win all the counties they claimed they would, made a good gain. Up to the present, but one Michigan county, Van Huron, has been "dry" for any length of time.

One county, Grand Traverse, is in doubt.

Monroe, Mich., April 7.—The Democrats elected nearly the entire city and county ticket. The new board of supervisors will be Democratic and also the board of aldermen in the city. Boyce Dansard (Dem.) is elected mayor by a majority of 391.

The proposition to bond for \$50,000 for new sewer systems was lost; also a proposition to raise \$5,500 for the lighting plant.

Flint, Mich., April 7.—The largest vote ever polled in the city's history was cast Monday. H. C. Spencer (Rep.) defeated George E. McKinley (Dem.) by eighteen votes.

Owosso, Mich., April 7.—Wallace D. Burke (Dem.) won out over Stanley E. Parkill (Citizens') and Perry C. Storm (Rep.) by a majority of 248. The balance of the ticket is split up between the three lists of candidates who were in the field. Burke is a saloon keeper.

Kalamazoo, Mich., April 7.—The Democrats elected Frank H. Millham mayor by a plurality of 867. Four out of five aldermen were elected on the Democratic ticket. The vote was the heaviest ever recorded in Kalamazoo.

Battle Creek, Mich., April 7.—Again a Socialist won a place in the city council, Frank A. Kulp being the successful candidate. He defeated both Republican and Democratic nominees. In the second ward, where Franklin H. Starkey, defeated at the primaries for reappointment, backed the city committee and three candidates, Starkey won with a big majority.

Coldwater, Mich., April 7.—The Republicans carried Coldwater by a small majority here. They elected E.

A. Moore mayor. The Democrats elected two of the four supervisors and four aldermen.

Lapeer, Mich., April 7.—S. D. Brown was elected mayor on the Republican ticket by a majority of nearly 200. The only two candidates on the Democratic ticket who were successful were Wallace Weir for alderman of the First ward and Charles D. Coulter for police commissioner. This is Mayor Brown's fourth term.

Marshall, Mich., April 7.—George W. Leslie was elected mayor on the Republican ticket by ten majority. This is the first time the Republicans have carried the city in nine years. The balance of the Democratic ticket was elected. It was the largest vote ever polled here.

St. Joseph, Mich., April 7.—Edgar Aber (Dem.) received 269 majority over C. E. Dickinson (Rep.). St. Joseph declared for good roads by about 300 majority.

Benton Harbor, Mich., April 7.—A sweeping Republican victory is the result of the election in Benton Harbor; not one Democrat being elected. W. H. Seitz is elected mayor over M. H. Morrow (Dem.).

Alpena, Mich., April 7.—Democrats elected E. E. McKnight, mayor; J. F. Hiser, city treasurer. The Republicans elected Charles A. Reynolds, justice.

Menominee, Mich., April 7.—Mayor Augustus Spies (Rep.) was re-elected after one of the hottest municipal contests in this city, over Redmond Panborn (Dem.), by a majority of twelve. The city council is Democratic by a majority of two.

South Haven, Mich., April 7.—Judge James H. Johnson (Rep.) is elected mayor by 144 over E. S. Dyckman (Citizens'). The remainder of the Republican ticket is elected for the first time since South Haven became a city.

Niles, Mich., April 7.—The Democrats won a sweeping victory here, electing Matthew Stoll for mayor and the entire city ticket.

MI. Clemens, Mich., April 7.—Mayor Varnum J. Bowers was re-elected for his third term, with the entire Democratic city ticket.

Crosswell, Mich., April 7.—Republican ticket elected by large majority. P. L. Graham, mayor, has a majority of ninety-seven.

Standish, Mich., April 7.—W. N. Pomeroy (Rep.) elected mayor.

Port Huron, Mich., April 7.—The question of a direct nomination for congressmen was carried by a majority of 95; for state senator, 881. For establishing a municipal gas plant, the majority was 1,087.

Corunna, Mich., April 7.—There was but one ticket in the field, the Citizens' Union, the fight having all occurred at the caucus and convention. W. A. McMullen was re-elected mayor.

Northville, Mich., April 7.—With the exception of the office of treasurer, the entire Republican ticket went through. Adolph C. Baiden (Dem.) was elected for that office.

Belleville, Mich., April 7.—The entire Republican ticket, with the exception of supervisor and highway commissioner, was elected.
