Don't know what time we arrived at Milwaukee but it was early because it was before I was awake. After breakfast we woke up to the fact that Milwaukee is a fine place with lots of buildings and some things that it can boast of that no other city can. The chief one is that they have more saloons than all the rest of the United States combined. We drove around and around until we were full of saloon signs.
