


Coming Chautauqua Week

 A BLIND man sitting in a Chautauqua audience in Michigan last summer, following Wells Watson Ginn's rendition of "The Man From Home," declared that had he not been informed otherwise he would surely have thought that the play was being produced by a group of actors instead of by one man. Each character with its distinctive quality of voice became real. It is doubtful, however, if the play was any more real to this blind man than to those who could see, for he expressed the expression of face and the gestures and other features of the impersonation which still further distinguished one of the characters from the others which Mr. Ginn portrays. One of the authors of the play, has heard Mr. Ginn give the interpretation of all. Booth Tarkington in a personal letter to him.
