NO INTOXICATED CHAUFFEURS

The demand of the Michigan Grange that a man once found intoxicated at the wheel of an automobile have his automobile license revoked and be severely punished if found driving a machine afterward is perhaps unduly severe. Yet the principle is right. No man not in the full possession of his faculties should be permitted to drive an automobile upon the public highways, where the danger of accident always exists. The motor car has too great possibilities for injury. The man who is habitually not master of himself is totally unqualified to act as chauffeur. He should not be permitted to endanger the lives of others. No drunken engineer is tolerated upon a railroad; neither should an intoxicated chauffeur be tolerated on the streets, where he is likely to run down others. We have too many automobile accidents. One way to reduce them would be by a more careful supervision of those who operate cars, with a view to eliminating all who for any reason are incompetent to drive.

ANTHRACNOSE NOW DECLARED NO BAR TO SALE OF BEANS

Reputed Order Branded a Misunderstanding by Secretary Houston.

The bean situation presents another illustration of the error into which many may be led by statements sent out from Washington and accepted as correct by the daily press. The statement that the Federal authorities proposed to put a ban on the sale of beans affected by anthracnose was apparently accepted as correct by Governor Ferris and other authorities. Now Secretary Houston declares that the matter is wholly misunderstood. Some canned beans were seized and condemned as unfit for food. No objection will be made to the use of anthracnose beans for canning purposes, provided they are properly put up and no objectionable ingredients combined with them.

We trust this statement may be found correct and that the next report from Washington will not have an entirely different version of the matter.
