The game was a rough one throughout, but highly interesting to the spectators as the teams were never more than three points apart, and this probably had something to do with making the game a rough one.

For the entire game it looked as though the Normal would make a spurt which would carry them into the lead and give them the game, but the locals held on tight, refusing to give them a lead which might win the bout, and when time was called the two teams were tied at 28 points each.

This necessitated five minutes of overtime play and during this time the locals connected for two baskets and the Normal were able to secure just one foul basket, and the Alma team won the game by a score of 32 to 29.




