ALMA WINS SECOND M. I. A. A. GAME

Hillsdale Goes to Defeat Before Alma Team.

Those who were fortunate enough to be on Davis Field Friday afternoon were rewarded by seeing one of the best baseball games of the season. Best, not only in point of the fact that Alma won, but also that it was a clean, close-fought battle from start to finish. At no time did the interest in the game lag and at no time did either side have any decided lead.

The first inning started with Alma in the field and Hillsdale at the plate. The first man made a ground hit between first and second but was easily put out at first. The next man up was the little Jap, who managed to place the ball in left field for a three base hit. The fact that he proved an easy victim the next time up, seems to point that Boyne had not yet struck his regular pace. The next two men failed to hit and Alma came to bat. Pelton led off for Alma. He let the first two balls go by, but put a foul over the grandstand on the third. He missed the next and then made what seemed to be a hit along first base line, but it was called a foul and he came back to the plate. He was put out on a pop-up near third base. Smith next came to bat but failed to locate the high ball of the Hillsdale pitcher. Boyne then succeeded in putting the ball between first and second for a single. Ardis followed by a hit just for the second baseman, who tried for it but evidently found it too hot for his liking. Graham came to bat but failed to hit.

At the opening of the second Boyne began to show his regular form and easily sent the first two men to the bench. The next man placed a grounder down near third and got on first. The next man went to the bench without even feeling of the ball and Alma came in from the field. "Bill" Richards (or perhaps I should say William) was Alma's first man up. He failed to locate the ball and Seelye stepped to the plate. He too could not get around the Hillsdale pitcher and went to the bench without even trying for the three balls that were put straight over the plate in rapid succession. Warner followed his example and the second inning ended without either side having scored.

In the beginning of the third Hillsdale failed to hit; even the little Jap was unable to connect with the ball this time. Chadwick, Alma's first man up, fanned and was followed by Pelton who got on first by a grounder through the pitcher and second baseman. On a ball Pelton made second. Smith bunted, made first, and put Pelton on third. Boyne made a pop-fly to the second baseman and the men held their bases. Ardis struck out and thus the two runs were killed on bases.

In the fourth inning Hillsdale managed to get a man around to third and he came home for Hillsdale's first score, when Smith threw the ball to first after missing it on the batter's last strike. They failed to gain any more in this inning. Graham, Alma's first man up, fell prey to the Hillsdale pitcher. Richards got on first and

stole second while Seelye was at bat. The latter made a grounder through first and made second base on it. This brought Richards in with Alma's first score. Warner bunted and brought Seelye to third. Chadwick followed with a grounder that put him on first and brought Seelye home. Pelton hit into left field, made second and sent Chadwick home.

Hillsdale again failed to hit in the fifth inning. Boyne came up for Alma and was put out on first. Ardis then placed the ball between short and second for a single. Ardis came home on a wild throw to second. Richards was put out on a hit down first base line and Alma went to the field again.

In the sixth inning, Hillsdale managed to get three runs so it now stood 5-4 in favor of the visitors. However, Alma failed to hit in the latter part of this inning and the seventh was entered with interest at its highest pitch.

Hillsdale failed to find the ball or place it for a hit in the seventh but Alma made a run in her half of the inning. Pelton made the score that tied, by a good hit through the pitcher and second baseman. So this inning ended with the score tied, 5 and 5.

Neither side scored in the eighth and it began to look like a repetition of the Kalamazoo game. Likewise, Hillsdale failed to score in the beginning of the ninth. But, Alma did score. Smith made first on a grounder and then kept right on going until he had stolen third. Boyne brought him in with a grounder to first base. Thus ended the game 6-5 in favor of the home team.

Inasmuch as Hillsdale was considered one of the strongest of the M. I. A. A. teams, and that Kalamazoo has already fallen before Alma, it now looks as though we had more than a fighting chance at the big stakes. Let us help the team duplicate the football championship! Let us give them the support they deserve! Speaking on the same subject, I believe there is no law forbidding the attendance of every Alma student at athletic games. Let us not act as if there were such a law.

REPAIR MACHINES IN WINTER

Farmers Should Give Careful Attention to Tools and Implements for Next Season.

During the winter months farmers should give careful attention to the work of repairing all machines which will be used next season. This will acquaint manufacturers and their agents with the demand in different sections and enable them to make the best possible distribution. At the same time it will eliminate expensive delays in transportation at the busy season.

The natural food of poultry consists of grains, insects, green forage and grit, and accordingly in domestication it is reasonable that the hens receive cereal grains and other milling products, and such animal feeds as meat meals and skim milk, and should also have an abundance of green feed or such substitutes for it as roots or steamed clover. Oyster shells, grit and plenty of fresh water should also be supplied.

ORINANCE NO. 191 An Ordinance of the City of Alma, Michigan, establishing the salaries of the various elective and appointive officers of said city of Alma, Michigan, for the fiscal year commencing with the first Tuesday of May 1918, and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances heretofore adopted relative thereto. The City of Alma Ordinance. SECTION 1. That for and during the fiscal year commencing with the first Tuesday of May, 1918, the respective salaries of the elective and appointive officers of said City of Alma, Michigan, shall be as follows: (A) Mayor, Fifty Dollars per year. (B) Aldermen, Fifty Dollars per year, each. (C) City Clerk, Twelve Hundred Dollars per year, which shall include all services performed by him upon the Charter Commission. (D) City Treasurer, Five Hundred Fifty Dollars per year. (E) City Marshal and Chief of Police, One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars per year, and he shall furnish his own uniform. (F) Policemen, Ninety Dollars per month each, for first three months of each man's service, and One Hundred Dollars per month each thereafter, and they shall each furnish their own uniform. (G) The City Attorney shall receive an annual salary of Five Hundred Dollars, together with such further compensation for services rendered to the City as may be determined by the City Council. (H) The Street and Sewer Commissioner shall receive an annual salary of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars, and shall perform all of the duties connected with said office without further compensation. (I) The Health Officer shall receive an annual salary of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars, and shall act as milk inspector of said city without further compensation, which shall also cover all services for any duties he may perform. (J) The Chief of the Fire Department shall receive an annual salary of One Hundred Fifty Dollars. (K) The members of the Fire Department (not exceeding twelve in number) shall each receive an annual salary of One Hundred Fifty Dollars. (L) The City Fire Truck Driver shall receive an annual salary of Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars, and shall be furnished with

apartments in Alma's Public Building sufficient for himself and family during the year. Said apartments to be heated and lighted at the expense of said city.

Said City Fire Truck Driver shall also act as Fire Warden of said city without further compensation.

(N) The Dog Warden shall receive such compensation for his services rendered to the city as is provided by law, set their hands and seals to the following Ordinance.

SECTION 1. The salaries prescribed and provided for in Section 1 of this Ordinance (A) (N), both inclusive shall be paid as follows:

The following officials shall be paid semi-annually: City Clerk, City Marshal and Chief of Police, Policemen, Superintendent of Water Works and Sewers, Street and Wood Commissioner, City Fire Truck Driver and Fire Warden.

The following officials shall be paid monthly: City Treasurer and City Attorney.

The following officials shall be paid quarterly: Health Officer, Chief of the Fire Department and members of the City Fire Department.

The following officials shall be paid semi-annually: Mayor and Aldermen.

To all of the above-named officials the City Clerk is hereby authorized to draw an order on the Treasurer accordingly.

SECTION 2. That all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances heretofore adopted relative to said salaries are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. That this Ordinance shall take immediate effect, upon its adoption and due publication thereof.
