OBITUARY

Daniel Bailey was an old pioneer of Gratiot county, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. H. E. Church of this city Tuesday, September 24, 1916.

August Bailey was born in Ohio August 27, 1835. In 1870 he was united in marriage with Miss Elizabeth Zink and moved to Michigan during the same year. To this union were born five children, one of whom died in infancy. Four daughters are living, they being Mrs. Mary Hilsinger of Alma, Mrs. Eliza Hagerman of Riverdale, Mrs. Emma Romine of Alma, and Mrs. Anna M. Church of Alma. He also leaves to mourn their loss, seventeen grandchildren and three great grandchildren, besides a number of other relatives and a host of friends.

Mr. Bailey with his wife, settled on a farm near Elwell soon after coming to Michigan. Six years ago Mr. Bailey gave up farming and made his home with his daughter, his wife having died in 1899.

The funeral was held at the M. E. church Thursday and interment was made at Elwell, the body being placed by the side of that of his wife.
