COMING HERE

Former Governor of Tennessee Will Speak Here Regarding New Era.

The Hon. Malcolm R. Patterson, former governor of Tennessee, will speak in Alma at the First Presbyterian church, Friday evening, October 17, on the subject, "The Era and the Present World Outlook."

This is simply one of the hundreds of National-World prohibition rallies which are now being conducted in every section of the United States by the Anti-Saloon League of America, with the co-operation of the state leagues. An offering as an aid to financing the world prohibition movement will be taken.

With prohibition achieved in both the United States and Canada, the league has just one logical step that it could turn to, and that was to extend prohibition to all the world, the first step of which was the formation at Columbus, Ohio, in November of 1918 of the World League Against Alcoholism.

The Hon. Malcolm R. Patterson, not only a former governor of Tennessee, but also a member of congress from that state, is one of the most able and brilliant statesmen that that state has produced in years. As a platform orator he has no peer in his state, and very few in the nation. For years he was an opponent of prohibition, but is now fighting the traffic which he formerly fought for.

It is certain that Alma people who attend the lecture will hear one of the best orators in the country, but will also hear a wonderfully interesting and instructive lecture for world wide prohibition.
