IS INTERESTING

Panama Interesting Place for the Soldier Says Schultz.

Pvt. 1st Cl. Frank B. Schultz, formerly a sergeant of Company "I" 10th Infantry who has been transferred to recruiting service and stationed in the local recruiting office at Alma gives an interesting account of army life in Panama.

Opportunities for men who enlist in the Canal Zone are varied and interesting, he says and valuable experience may be obtained in the production of tobacco, sugar, tropical fruits, especially coconuts and in the raising of cattle.

The outstanding feature for enlisted men in the canal zone is the Panama Canal itself. Its length is only 50 miles; so an excursion can be made through the Canal in from 6 to 8 hours. Here the soldier has the opportunity not only to get first hand information of the greatest engineering feat in the history of the world, but also experience all the fascinations of a sojourn in the tropics.

Pvt. Schultz also says a man can see ships, passengers and crews from every quarter of the globe. The American port of entry on the Pacific Balboa. Four days and a half are required for the trip from New Orleans transport, the voyage taking the soldier through the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean sea.

During the hottest months there is a trade wind that blows across the Isthmus, which makes the climate cool and delightful, the temperature never rises above 100 degrees and never falls below 65. The evenings are cool and one can sleep under a blanket. Health conditions of today in the Canal zone are as good as they are in the United States.

There are permanent quarters for enlisted men; also Y. M. C. A. and other institutions for entertainment and welfare; such as baseball clubs, boating, swimming, tennis, golf links, etc. In addition there is excellent fishing and many points of interest to visit, including the ruins of several old Spanish forts and an old Spanish city.

Pvt. Schultz says he could relate experiences of many kinds and advise men who wish to take advantage of this opportunity to see life in the tropics and to enlist at once as there are only a limited number of men required for duty in the canal zone. The army recruiting station is located at 131 1/2 Superior St., Alma, Michigan.

LEGAL NOTICES

ORDINANCE NO. 112 An Ordinance providing for inspection and the sanitary condition of all places where food is prepared, cooked, or served to the public, and prohibiting the employment of any person therein male or female, unless such person shall have obtained a certificate from the local health officer, that he or she is not afflicted with any venereal or other communicable disease; providing for the examination of all persons who shall make application for such certificate; and providing a penalty for all violations of this ordinance.

THE CITY OF ALMA ORDAINS:

Section 1. No person shall work or be employed in any restaurant, cafe, cafeteria, dairy-lunch, coffee-room, tea-room, hotel, dining room, bakery, or other place where food is prepared, cooked or served to the public, who is afflicted with any venereal or other communicable disease.

Section 2. Before any person shall work or be employed, as provided in section one hereof, such person shall obtain from the local health officer, a certificate that such person is free from any venereal or other communicable disease.

Section 3. That any person who now works in or who is now employed by any person, as provided in section one hereof, shall obtain from the local health officer, a certificate that he or she is free from any venereal or other communicable disease, and any such person now employed and working in any such place who shall refuse to obtain such certificate, shall cease and discontinue such work until such certificate is obtained.

Section 4. That no person shall permit or employ any person to work in any place where food is prepared, cooked, or served to the public, as provided in section one hereof, unless such person shall have procured from the local health officer a certificate that he or she is not afflicted with any venereal or other communicable disease.

Section 5. For the purpose of obtaining the certificate herein provided, each person now working, and each person who shall be hereafter employed in any place as provided in section one hereof, shall make application in writing to the said local health officer, upon blanks to be provided by him for that purpose, and it shall be the duty of such local health officer to make or cause to be made, such examination of the applicant, as shall be necessary to satisfy him that such applicant is or is not afflicted with any such venereal or other communicable disease, and if satisfied, that no such disease exists in such applicant, he shall issue to such applicant a certificate to that effect. Provided, however, that upon request in writing by such applicant, such examination may be made by the personal or family physician of such applicant, providing that such local health officer is satisfied that such physician is one of good standing in his profession, and the written report of such physician shall be prima facie evidence as to the condition of such applicant, and said local officer may be guided thereby in issuing such certificate. Provided further, that in no case shall such examination be made by any person other than a duly registered and qualified physician of the City of Alma.

Section 6. No charge shall be made to the applicant for said certificate nor shall any charge be made for such examination as herein provided, when such examination is made by the local health officer or by some physician employed by him, but should such examination be made by the personal or family physician of the applicant, then such applicant shall pay such physician for such examination.

Section 7. Any certificate issued by the local health officer as herein provided, may, by him, be annulled whenever he shall be satisfied that such person to whom such certificate was issued, has, since the issuing thereof, become infected with any such venereal or other communicable disease. When any complaint in writing shall be made by any person or officer that any person is so conducting himself or herself as to raise doubt as to their physical condition, the said local health officer shall require such person to be examined as provided in section five hereof, and if any such person to whom any such certificate as in this ordinance provided has been issued, shall refuse to be so examined, his or her certificate shall be revoked and annulled, and such person shall be required to cease and discontinue working in any place as provided in section one hereof, until a further examination is had and a new certificate issued by the local health officer.

Section 8. The local health officer shall at any time he may deem it necessary, and not less than once in every month of the year, make a personal inspection and examination of all such places as are designated in section one hereof, and he shall have the right and privilege to see and question all persons working or employed to work in any such place, and if in his judgment upon such inspection and examination, he shall deem it best, he may request any person so working or employed in any such place to come to his office for examination, or require them to be so examined by their personal or family physician under the provisions of this ordinance as provided in section five hereof, and any person who shall refuse to comply with the request of such local health officer, shall forfeit his or her certificate, and further shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished as is hereinafter provided for the punishment of all violations of this said ordinance; Any person who shall refuse to permit such local health officer to make the inspection or examination provided for herein, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as hereinafter provided for the punishment of all violations of this said ordinance.

Section 9. If upon such inspection and examination by said local health officer of any place designated in section one hereof, he shall find any unsanitary conditions, it shall be his duty to require that such place be made sanitary and any person refusing or neglecting to comply with any request or order of such health officer, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as hereinafter provided for the punishment of all violations of this said ordinance.

Section 10. If, upon such inspection by said local health officer he shall find the place so inspected to be in a sanitary condition, and the persons working therein to have obtained the certificate of health herein provided for, he shall issue a license to the owner of such place, in which it shall state the date of inspection and that the place is sanitary and the persons working therein to have a certificate of health showing that they are free from all venereal or other communicable disease, which said license shall be conspicuously posted in the place so inspected, and shall continue so posted therein as long as such place shall remain in a sanitary condition and the persons working therein are free from disease, but should such place become unsanitary, or should any person employed therein refuse to obtain the certificate of health in this ordinance provided, then said license shall be revoked and such place ordered closed, until the provisions of this ordinance shall be complied with.

Section 11. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by a court of competent jurisdiction, such person so convicted shall pay a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars and costs, or be confined in the county jail of the county of Gratiot, Michigan, for a period not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Section 12. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force twenty days from and after its adoption and due publication thereof.

When any complaint in writing shall be made by any person or officer that any person is so conducting himself or herself as to raise doubt as to their physical condition, the said local health officer shall require such person to be examined as provided in section five hereof, and if any such person to whom any such certificate as in this ordinance provided has been issued, shall refuse to be so examined, his or her certificate shall be revoked and annulled, and such person shall be required to cease and discontinue working in any place as provided in section one hereof, until a further examination is had and a new certificate issued by the local health officer.

Section 8. The local health officer shall at any time he may deem it necessary, and not less than once in every month of the year, make a personal inspection and examination of all such places as are designated in section one hereof, and he shall have the right and privilege to see and question all persons working or employed to work in any such place, and if in his judgment upon such inspection and examination, he shall deem it best, he may request any person so working or employed in any such place to come to his office for examination, or require them to be so examined by their personal or family physician under the provisions of this ordinance as provided in section five hereof, and any person
