GRASSHOPPER CONTROL

Burning Both Useless and Dangerous According to Authorities.

That fire as a means of controlling grasshoppers in sections of the state where the pest is breaking out badly at present is both useless and dangerous is the statement of experts at the Michigan Agricultural College and the University of Michigan. Burning over areas in an effort to destroy the hoppers is said to be of little avail, while forestry men point out the great danger of forest fires where blazes become unmanageable.

Reports coming to Professor P. S. Lovejoy, Forestry Department at the U. of M., from deputy fire wardens in the northern part of the state, indicate that there have already been losses from this "hopper control" fire activity, and the danger of large burnings following a continuance of the practice is said to be great.

"Fires are not necessary in grasshopper eradication work," says Prof. R. H. Pettit, Entomology Department at the Michigan Agricultural College, "and what is more they are of little avail." The use of poison bait is said by Professor Pettit to be the proper measure of control, and the one which is advocated by the agricultural college.

The grasshopper menace is said to be more menacing that it has been in any season for more than twenty years, and every effort at proper control is urged by the college authorities. The following method of preparing and distributing the poison bait is given by Professor Pettit: Into a bushel of screened sawdust thoroughly mix, by sifting, a pound of poison, either paris green, white arsenic or crude arsenious oxide. In a gallon of water dissolve three-fourths of a pound of salt and add one-half of a cup of molasses. Slowly pour this into the poisoned sawdust while the mixture is being stirred. Add enough more water to make a good stiff "mash."

This poisoned bait can safely be taken in the hands and spread broadcast. It should not be left in piles around the field but should be well scattered. A bushel of this poison should cover about three acres of ground. The best results from the use of this poison are to be expected when it is used late in the afternoon. Thus it will not dry out over night and will be fresh when the hungry hoppers go for it in the morning.

If put out in piles the chances are that there will be some danger to cattle from the use of this poison, but if applied as recommended no trouble is likely to result. However, it is best to salt the cattle before applying the poison to their feeding-grounds, as they will be less attracted to the mixture.

So we see that they could not enter in because of unbelief.



A Very Serious Situation

Since April 1st, when the Government relinquished control over coal prices, the price of coal has mounted steadily until we are now paying \$7.00 f. o. b. mines for the same coal that we paid \$2.75 for under Government supervision. This not only is squeezing the life out-blood out of the Gas Companies but it means that if coal prices stay at their present level that soft coal will sell at \$12.50 per ton in Alma and with the increase in freight rates that is expected soon, the price would be \$13.50 to the consumer in Alma.

There is a bill before Congress now placing an embargo on all foreign shipments of coal; if this bill is passed it will help the situation considerably.
