RESOLUTION

Whereas, the State Highway Department, under the act providing for the construction of state trunk line highways, are about to construct a pavement twenty feet wide on West Superior street in the city of Alma, commencing at the end of the present pavement now on said street and running west to the city limits; on Wright avenue from the end of the present pavement now on said street to the north city limits; and on East Superior street from Euclid avenue east to the city limits, except that portion already paved from Bridge avenue east to Republic avenue; and Whereas, for the purpose of better caring for the large amount of traffic on these respective streets and avenue, and as a matter of public improvement, it becomes necessary to extend the width of these respective pavements as follows: On Superior street west to the city limits, and on Wright avenue, north to north line of Elwell street, said pavement to be extended a total of ten feet; that is to say, there should be an extension of five feet on each side of said twenty-foot pavement, making the total width of said pavement at these points thirty feet; on East Superior street from Euclid avenue east to Bridge avenue to be extended six feet, that is to say, there should be an extension on each side of said twenty-foot pavement of three feet, making a total width of pavement at this point of twenty-six feet; all of said extension to be finished with curb and gutter; and Whereas, the said State Highway Department was so notified to prepare specifications and profiles of the respective streets and avenues of the said width of thirty and twenty-six feet extensions at the points above specified, as provided in a certain resolution passed and adopted by the City Commission, April 27th, 1920, and which said specifications and profiles have been so made by said department; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the City Commission now in session, that it is necessary and a needed and a necessary public improvement to pave the aforesaid streets and avenue to the width of ten feet and six feet, respectively, as above set forth, and that said extensions be finished with curb and gutter in accordance with the aforesaid specifications and profiles; and be it further

Resolved, that the paving district and the lands embraced therein to be assessed for such improvement, are those lands abutting upon and adjacent to said necessary street extensions as above set forth, except as to all street intersections, which are hereby authorized to be paid, if said improvement be ordered, from the city's Special Street Improvement Fund; and be it further

Resolved, that the City Commission will be in session at its chambers in the city hall in the said city of Alma, on Tuesday, July 27th, 1920, at eight o'clock p. m. of said day for the purpose of hearing any and all objections thereto, if any, and that notice thereof be given by a two weeks' publication of this resolution in the Alma Record, a newspaper published and circulated in the said city of Alma, all as provided by the City Charter. 55-2-c

MILLION TO MEET AT STATE EXHIBIT

MICHIGAN NOW HAS LARGEST FAIR IN UNITED STATES—DATES SET ARE SEPTEMBER 3-12.

PROFITS GO BACK INTO CONTINUOUS BETTERMENT

An attendance of a million is predicted for the Michigan State Fair at Detroit, Sept. 3 to 12, this fall.

This estimate is based both on the public interest which has been shown in the fair so far this year, and on natural increase which may be expected over last year's showing.

When the last person passed through the turnstile at the 1919 show, the Michigan Fair had taken rank as the largest-attended institution of its kind in the United States. Every effort is promised by G. W. Dickinson, Secretary-Manager, to make this year's exhibition once again the nation's standard.

"Michigan's state fair," says Mr. Dickinson, "has become the greatest institution in the commonwealth for bringing its people together. No other activity fostered by the state brings any where near so many of its citizens together on common terms.

"In one way, it is the state's greatest educational institution. The character of fairs has changed greatly in the last few years. No one who attends a real fair nowadays can come away without having been mentally broadened and instructed. The city man sees the vast agricultural resources of Michigan; the farmer sees the cities' manufactured products which have given this state so advanced a position in the industrial world.

Every satisfactory feature of Michigan's fairs in the past will be retained this year, and many new ones will be added. Greatly increased gate receipts have made the fair profitable in late years, and under the state law, every cent of profit must go back into the permanent property and the annual exhibition.

EXHIBITORS MUST HURRY TO GET INTO STATE FAIR

Exhibitors who plan on entering the contests at the Michigan State Fair, at Detroit, Sept. 3-12, this fall, will have to hurry.
