First Ward—1st precinct, City Hall; 2nd precinct, Superior Baking Co. Garage. Second Ward—Alma Journal Office; Redman's Wholesale Grocery. Third Ward—Areada Hotel. Fourth Ward—Edson-Moore Sample Room.

For the purpose of placing in nomination by all political parties participating therein, candidates for the following offices, viz: STATE—One candidate for Governor; one candidate for Lieutenant Governor. CONGRESSIONAL—One candidate for Representative in Congress for the 12th district of which said city forms a part. LEGISLATIVE—One candidate for Senator in the State Legislature for the 12th district of which said city forms a part; one candidate for Representative in the State Legislature for the Legislative district of which said city forms a part.

COUNTY—Also candidates for the following county offices, viz: Judge of Probate, County Clerk, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Prosecuting Attorney, 2 Circuit Court Commissioners, one county drain commissioner, one surveyor, two coroners.

Delegates to County Conventions There shall also be elected as many delegates to the County Convention of the several political parties as said ward, precinct or district is entitled to under the call of the county committee of said political parties, which number will be indicated by the number blank lines printed on each of the ballots cast at said election under the heading, "Delegates to County Conventions." The Board of Primary Election Inspectors will furnish delegates with credentials, entitling them to seats in the county conventions, except that where there is more than one precinct in a ward or district and the county committee requires the election of delegates from the ward or district as a whole, such delegates should be admitted without credentials. Names of candidates for delegates to county conventions will not appear on the official primary ballots, but will be written or pasted in by the voter, in the place designated on said ballots.

Suggestions Relative to Voting Separate ballots for each political party will be provided. The voter should name the political party of his choice when asking for a ballot and in marking his ballot must make a cross in the square next to the name of each elector for whom he desires to vote, and can vote for only one candidate except where two candidates are named in which case he should vote for two.

RELATIVE TO REGISTRATION—Please note that all provisions of the laws now in force are done away with, and if you are not already registered in the precinct where you reside, you must register under the provisions of law as set forth in the Registration Notices posted in connection with this notice of primary election.

Notice Relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls—Act No. 20, Public Acts of 1919, Section 1. On the day of election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the morning, or such earlier hour as may be provided, and shall be continued open until five o'clock in the afternoon and no longer.
