

# ALMA GLEE CLUB TAKES LONG TRIP

### Biggest Musical Organization of Kind at College Gets Longest Trip.

The Alma college glee club is rapidly rounding out into a high class musical organization, and is giving promise of being the finest organization of the kind that has ever gone out from the Maroon and Cream institution.

Not only is it expected to contain the best talent that an Alma Glee Club ever had, but it will also be the largest organization of the kind that has ever represented the institution, consisting as it does of twenty-three members.

Close followers of musical organizations in the smaller colleges of the state are also making the claim that it is the largest glee club that has ever represented any of the smaller colleges of the state.

The itinerary for the 1921 club is also the best that has ever been offered to an Alma musical organization of any kind, the annual spring trip calling for sixteen dates in western Michigan and in the northern peninsula of the state. The club will travel 1,670 miles on the trip, which will start Monday, March 21, at St. Louis, and will be brought to a close at Grayling on Wednesday, April 6.

The program of the glee club will be divided into three parts, the first being music by the entire club membership, the second division vocal solos by Professor Beausang and violin solos by Mr. Thoms. The third division will consist of operetta, readings, colored quartette, etc.

Since coming to Alma College last fall both Professor Beausang and Mr. Thoms have been meeting with a rapidly gaining favor in central Michigan musical circles, and their connection with the glee club promises to add considerable interest to the work of the organization.
