ZETA SIGMA SOCIETY HOUSE



Through a deal consummated this past week Zeta Sigma Literary Society, Inc., of Alma College has come into possession of the fine new Chas. O. Ward residence at the corner of West Superior street and Lincoln avenue, and has already moved into the house which is now the home of the society. The purchase of the building by the college society marks the securing of a home for a society of the college for the first time in the history of the institution.

Soon after securing the option on the house some four weeks ago, just as it was being completed, the work of remodeling the third floor to make it into suitable quarters for the men of the society, was put under way. Changes were also made in the basement by the installation of shower baths, etc.

After securing the option on the building the members of the society banded their efforts to get the old members of the society to lend their co-operation to the project, and to a good degree were successful in the attempt. A check for \$500 from Mrs. John Dodge of Detroit, who recently became a trustee of the college, and which came as a real surprise to practically all members of the society, with the other funds secured, furnished the money needed to complete the deal.

Saturday and the first of the week the society moved into its new quarters which will be formally opened this week Friday. The formal opening will be continued until Monday and all former members of the society, who will be back for the Home Com-

ing game Saturday and the Zeta Sigma banquet Saturday evening, will be made welcome at the society house.

The new society house is a recently finished stucco house of three stories, located on the corner of Superior street and Wright avenue. The building was built originally for private use but it so completely filled the requirements of a society house that Zeta Sigma made immediate arrangements for its purchase. The house is in an ideal location. Just two blocks from the campus and three blocks from the heart of Alma, it is situated so as to allow the occupants to be in touch with the affairs on the campus and still to permit the privacy accommodations for about thirty men on the third floor. The second floor has large rooms which several men hold jointly as study rooms. The first floor has a large reception room with a fireplace, a study room and a reading room and a spacious open hallway. The woodwork is done in white and the floors are all of polished oak.

The purchase of this house marks the advent of the first society house on the campus of this college and shows that Alma College is rapidly growing toward the "greater Alma." The presence of a society house on the campus should draw desirable students to Alma and tend to keep them here until a full course is completed. Not only should it concern the new students, but it also should keep the Alumni in closer touch with Alma, for they will be drawn back to college affairs and will return with the assurance that they will be welcomed and well entertained.


