WOMEN TO BACK NEW CHILD LAW

TOWNSEND RESOLUTION AIMS TO AID CHILD WORKERS THROUGHOUT U. S.

When the United States supreme court last summer declared unconstitutional the Child Labor law as adopted by congress...

ARTICLE

The Congress shall have power to regulate the employment and the hours of labor and conditions of employment of persons under eighteen years of age.

This amendment, when adopted, will enable congress to regulate child labor in a way that will stand the test of the courts.

It will be a splendidly constructive work for women to press to completion. It will not be an easy campaign, but it is the most effective way in which to obtain permanent reform.

The child labor amendment is but one of many progressive and constructive measures fought for in Washington by Senator Townsend.

Perhaps his best known campaign is that for the St. Lawrence waterways project to give the Great Lakes ports a direct outlet to the sea.

This enormous work will revolutionize transportation methods and bring huge savings to farmers and industrial workers not only in the states adjacent to the Great Lakes, but in the entire Middle West and the great northwest.

Nearly a score of states have definitely recorded themselves as in favor of the St. Lawrence project.

In every one of them Senator Townsend of Michigan is regarded as the national leader of this movement.

All friends of this project want to see him remain in the U. S. Senate until this work is permanently arranged for.

Prof. Ferris talked movably in favor of the League of Nations two years ago before Michigan voters...

"Our country is one of the few in the world which is now paying its way as it goes, and I must regard with disfavor any tendency to interfere with this condition or to increase taxes."
