In Memoriam.
Mr. Henry C. Thompson died at his home in Orange county, N. C., October 5, 1901, at 4:30 a. m. He was near 65 years of age, and had not been sick very long. For many years Mr. Thompson had been in official service and every duty was performed carefully and conscientiously. No higher compliment could be paid to his integrity than the fact that in all these years no whisper was ever heard affecting his character. In his domestic life he was peculiarly fortunate. He was a most devoted husband and affectionate father, always kind and loving. By his neighbors he was held in the highest estimation, and he retained their esteem until the day of his death. It there was anything more marked than another in the characteristics of the deceased, it was the great virtue of charity, the charity that thinketh no evil. His moral qualities were always in the ascendant. Honor, fidelity, truth, courage, conscience, were ever with him and of him. He practiced what was just, and moved on straight lines. To these strong qualities he united the higher sentiments of generosity, magnanimity and sympathy for his fellow man. He was happy when he saw others happy, and he was always deeply affected by human suffering. Mr. Thompson was a Christian of the highest type. We cannot penetrate the heart or head and know their mysteries, but we believe that faith was in him and as clear to him as the daily light of heaven is to the physical eye. He had a Christian's courage, a Christian's charity and a Christian's grace. His piety was liberal, just, and it shone in his daily life. He was a member of the Presbyterian church at Bethlehem all of his life, and he loved his church. He was one of the Ruling Elders. We are happy in the belief that we can say of our departed friend, he lives, lives in that other and brighter sphere for which a just and upright career in the midst of evil had fitted him. With these hopes for our friend, having placed his body in the embrace of mother earth in the presence of a large concourse of friends, with sad hearts, and commended his soul to God who gave it, we pay this last tribute to his memory and hold out his upright and virtuous life for the imitation of his family and friends. The funeral services were conducted by his pastor. Surely a good man has been taken from us. May the Lord bless and comfort the bereaved.

DEATH AND BURIAL OF THE HON. JOSIAH TURNER.

Hon. Josiah Turner died at his home near here on Saturday morning, October 26th, at 10:15 o'clock. Mr. Turner was born December 22, 1821. He had been sick only a few days with typhoid fever, and was in town the week before his death.

Mr. Turner was born in Orange county. His father, Josiah Turner, Sr., was Sheriff of Orange and one of the most prominent citizens of the county. Josiah Turner, Jr., married Miss Sophia Devereux, of Raleigh. Four sons and one daughter resulted from this union. Two sons, Clever D. and Devereux Turner and the daughter still survive.

Mr. Turner was graduated at the University, studied law and was admitted to the bar and practiced law at Hillsboro until the breaking out of the war between the States, when he enlisted in the army and remained in service until he was wounded in battle. He was elected to the lower house of the Confederate Congress, and several times represented Orange in the Legislature. After the war he was elected to the lower house of the United States Congress, but was not allowed to take his seat. As editor of the Raleigh Sentinel he rendered valuable services to the State, and in his day and in his way he was a remarkable man. A true history of the services Mr. Turner rendered the State and of the man himself will never be written. History writers didn't admit him.

The funeral services were held from St. Matthew's Episcopal church Sunday at 12 o'clock m., in the presence of a large number of his relatives, neighbors and friends. Rev. S. Paxson Watters conducted the services.

The pallbearers were: Honorary—W. H. Holden, James Parks, W. R. Lloyd, James Webb, Henry N. Brown, Sr., A. L. Holden, B. Meares, W. F. Parks, Dr. D. C. Parris, John Laws, Wm. J. Freeland, Alex. Lloyd, A. J. Ruffin, Joo. Knox Hughes and Joseph A. Harris. Active—Henry Richards, J. S. Spurgeon, H. Windsor Webb, S. M. Gattie, N. W. Brown, H. L. Parish, J. Cheshire Webb and George C. Lynch.

The interment was made in the church yard beside the grave of his wife.
