PLAN OF ORGANIZATION. ARTICLE I. 1, An Executive Committee to consist of twenty-one members, three from each Congressional district, shall be appointed by the President of the Convention. 

CHARLESTON, S. C., October 18, 1867. NO. 101.

By the terms of the Act of Congress entitled 'An Act to provide for the more efficient government of the rebel States," passed March 2d, 1867, and of the Acts of March 23d, and July 19th, 1867, supplementary thereto,—it is made the duty of the Commanding General of this Military District to cause a registration to be made of the male inhabitants of the State of North-Carolina, of the age of twenty-one years and upwards and qualified by the terms of said Acts to vote, and after such registration is complete, to order an election to be held at which the registered voters of said State shall vote for or against a Convention, for the purpose of establishing a Constitution and civil government, for the said State, loval to the Union, and for de egates to said Convention, and to give at least thirty days' notice of the time and place at which said election shall be held; and the said registration having been completed in the State of North-Carolina, It is ordered: First. That an election be held in the State of North-Carolina, commencing on Tuesday, 19th day of November, 1867, and ending on Wednesday, the 20th day of November, 1867, at which all registered voters of said State may vote " For a Convention," or "Against a Convention," and for delegates to constitute the Convention-in

case a majority of the votes given on that question, shall be for a Convention, and in case a majority of the registered voters shall have voted on the question of holding such Convention. Second. It shall be the duty of the Boards of Registration in North-Carolina, commencing fourteen days prior to the election herein ordered, and giving reasonable public notice of the time and place thereof, to revise for a period of five days the registration lists, and upon being satisfied that any person not entitled thereto has been registered, to strike the name of such person from the list; and such person shall not be entitled to vote. The Boards of Registration shall also, during the same period, add to such registers the names of all persons who at that time possess the

qualifications required by said Acts, who have not already been registered. Third. In deciding who are to be stricken from or added to the registration lists, the Boards will be guided by the law of March 3d, 1867, and the laws supplementary thereto, and their attention is specially directed to the Supplementary Act of July 19th, 1867. Fourth. The said election will be held in each County or District at such places as may hereaf-

ter be designated, under the superintendence of the Boards of Registration as provided by law, and in accordance with instructions hereafter to be given to said Boards in conformity with the Acts of Congress and as far as may be with the Fifth. All judges and clerks employed in conducting said election, shall, before commencing to hold the same, be sworn to the faithful performance of their duties, and shall also take and

subscribe the oath of office prescribed by law for officers of the United States. Sixth. The polls shall be opened at such voting places at eight o'clock in the forenoon, and closed at four o'clock in the afternoon of each day, and shall be kept open during these bours without intermission or adjournment. Seventh. No member of the Board of Registration, who is a candidate for election as a delegate

to the convention, shall serve as a judge of the election in any County or District which he seeks Eighth. The sheriff and other peace officers of each County are required to be present during the whole time that the polls are kept open, and until the election is completed; and will be made responsible that there shall be no interference with judges of elections, or other interruption of good order. If there should be more than one polling place in any County, the sheriff of the County is empowered and directed to make such assignments of his deputies, and other peace officers, to the other polling places, as may, in his judgment, best subserve the purposes of quiet and order; and he is further required to report these arrangements in advance to the Commander

Ninth. Violence, or threats of violence, or of discharge from employment, or other oppressive means to prevent any person from registering, or exercising his right of voting, is positively pro-hibited, and any such attempts will be reported by the registrars or judges of election to the Post Commander, and will cause the arrest and trial of the oftenders by military authority.

Tenth. All bar rooms, saloons, and other places

of the Military Post in which his County is sit-

for the sale of liquors by retail, will be closed from 6 o'clock of the evening of the 18th of November, until 6 o'clock of the morning of the 21st of November, 1867, and during this time the sale of all intoxicating liquors at or near any polling place is prohibited. The police officers of cities and towns, and the sheriffs and other peace officers of Counties, will be held responsible for the strict n, and will pr ly arrest and hold for trial all persons who may transgress it.

Eleventh. Military interference with elections "unless it shall be necessary to repel the armed enemies of the United States, or to keep the peace

at the polls" is prohibited by the Act of Congress approved February 25th, 1865, and no soldiers will be allowed to appear at any polling place, unless as citizens of the State they are qualified. and are registered as voters, and then only for the purpose of voting; but the Commanders of Posts will keep their troops well in band on the days of election, and will be prepared to act promptly if each of the correction of the correction of the correction.
