Important discovery in purifying Gold Sand.--Our Virginia, Carolina, and other gold mine proprietors, will probably like to know that the Gazette of Commerce, of St. Petersburg, has just published the results of important experiments made at the mines of Zlatoust, in the different methods of extraction, by washing, the amalgam & acids. Col. Anassoff, of the corps of mining engineers, conceived the fortunate thought of melting the sands, to extract first, the iron, on the belief that the grains of gold were chiefly mingled with the oxide of iron in the sands. The results are these:--It is found the amalgam yielded eight times more gold than washing, the moist way by acids ten times more, and the melting of 2800 pounds of sand yielded twenty-nine times more. These experiments are to be carried on upon a still greater scale, throughout the line of the Oural mountains.
