COMMON SCHOOLS.

In pursuance of the provisions of an Act of Assembly, passed at the last Session, entitled "An Act for the establishment and better regulation of Common Schools," the President and Directors of the Literary Fund have thought proper to publish the following Tabular Statement, showing the amount of the income of the Literary Fund accruing since the passage of said Act, to the 1st of August, 1841, to which each County is entitled, according to its Federal Population, and making known that the said several sums will be paid to the persons properly entitled to receive the same, on or after the 1st day of September next. RECAPITULATION.

So that the amount of \$2,781 35, overpaid some of the Counties, will have to be made up out of the Funds at this time, and that amount stand against the same Counties, in the next distribution.

The Board having no official return of the late Census, have adopted a Report made to the last Legislature, in which the Federal population of each County is set forth. It is believed, however, to be very nearly accurate. *Cleveland will be entitled to a portion of the funds allotted Lincoln & Rutherford, in proportion to its Federal Population, taken from each. And Caldwell will be entitled to a portion of the funds allotted Burke and Wilkes, in proportion to its Federal Population, taken from each. *The several Counties will be required, before receiving their respective quotas, to satisfy the Board that they have voted for the School law, as required by the Act of Assembly.
