Friday, Nov. 5, 1875
ORDINANCES
Passed by the N. C. Constitutional Convention of 1875.

The people of North Carolina in Convention assembled do ordain, That section two of the ninth article of the Constitution, be amended by adding the following words: "And the children of the white race and the children of the colored race shall be taught in separate public schools, but there shall be no discrimination made in favor of, or to the prejudice of, either race."
Read three times and ratified in open Convention, this 30th September, 1875.

The people of North Carolina in Convention assembled do ordain, That the following be an additional section to article two of the Constitution: "Sec.—The members of the General Assembly of the term for which they have been elected, shall receive as a compensation for their services the sum of four dollars per day for each day of their session, for a period not exceeding sixty days; and should they remain longer in session, they shall serve without compensation. They also shall be entitled to receive ten cents per mile, both while coming to the seat of government and while returning home, the said distance to be computed by the nearest line or route of public travel. The compensation of the presiding officers of the two Houses, shall be six dollars per day and mileage."
Should an extra session of the General Assembly be called, the members and presiding officers shall receive a like rate of compensation for a period not exceeding twenty days.

Read three times and ratified in open Convention, this 30th day of September, 1875.

The people of North Carolina in Convention assembled do ordain, That section twenty-seven, of Article two, of the Constitution, be amended so as to read as follows: "Section.—The terms of office for Senators and members of the House of Representatives shall commence at the time of their election."
Read three times and ratified in open Convention, this 30th day of September, 1875.

The people of North Carolina in Convention assembled do ordain, That section 29, of Article 2, of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows: "Section.—The election for members of the General Assembly shall be held for the respective districts and counties, at the places where they are now held, or may be directed hereafter to be held, in such manner as may be prescribed by law on the first Thursday in August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight and every two years thereafter. But the General Assembly may change the time of holding the election."
Read three times and ratified in open Convention, this 30th day of September, 1875.

The people of North Carolina in Convention assembled do ordain, That section 29, of Article 2, of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows: "Section.—Every male person, born in the United States, and every male person who has been naturalized, twenty-one years old or upward, who shall have resided in the State twelve months next preceding the election, and ninety days in the county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed an elector. But no person, who upon conviction or confession in open court, shall be adjudged guilty of felony, or of any other crime infamous by the laws of this State and hereafter committed, shall be deemed an elector, unless such person shall be restored to the rights of citizenship in a mode prescribed by law."
Read three times and ratified in open Convention, this 9th day of October, 1875.

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Read three times and ratified in open Convention, this 9th day of October, 1875.

The people of North Carolina in Convention assembled do ordain, That section eight, of Article two, be stricken from the Constitution.
Read three times and ratified in open Convention, this 30th day of September, 1875.

Ordinance to add a Section to Article four, of the Constitution of North Carolina.
The people of North Carolina in Convention assembled do ordain, That the amendments made to this Constitution shall not have the effect to vacate any office now existing under the Constitution of the State, and filed, or held, by virtue of any election or appointment under the said Constitution, and the laws of the State made in pursuance thereof.
Read three times and ratified in open Convention, this 4th day of October, 1875.

Ordinance to amend Article four of the Constitution, by striking out Sections twenty-six and twenty-seven, and inserting another in lieu thereof.
The people of North Carolina in Convention assembled do ordain, That sections twenty-six and twenty-seven, article four of the Constitution be stricken out, and insert the following: "The Justices of the Supreme Court shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State, as is provided for the election of members of the General Assembly. They shall hold their offices for eight years."
The Judges of Superior Courts, elected at the first election under this amendment, shall be elected in like manner as is provided for Justices of the Supreme Court, and shall hold their offices for eight years. The General Assembly may, from time to time, provide by law that the Judges of the Superior Courts, chosen at succeeding elections, instead of being elected by the voters of the whole State, as is herein provided for, shall be elected by the voters of their respective districts.
Read three times and ratified in open Convention, this 9th day of October, 1875.
