AGREEMENT AS TO CHINA.

It Brings to a Close a Warm Diplomatic Controversy.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—The announcement that the extension of the foreign concessions at Shanghai, China, has been finally approved brings to a close a diplomatic controversy between Great Britain, the United States and France, which has at times become rather acute, France taking the position at one stage of the negotiations that the American co-operation with the British in opposing the French plan of extension was an unfriendly act toward France. This, and the other differences, have been happily adjusted, according to announcements from China, which are borne out by the information of officials here.

ANTI-GOEBEL FORCES.

They Have Engaged Headquarters at Kentucky Capital.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Jan. 2.—The anti-Goebel Democrats, through ex-Congressman W. C. Owens, have engaged headquarters. Senator Lindsay, who came home from Washington at the beginning of the holidays, was conspicuous in the anti-Goebel councils. Chairman Long, of the Republican state campaign committee, has called a meeting of the members of both houses for a joint conference. It is expected that a report will then be received from the anti-Goebel Democrats regarding their attitude on the organization of the session will be talked over.

Supposed to Have Foundered.

MARSEILLES, Jan. 2.—Great anxiety is felt here regarding the fate of the French steamer Pierre le Grand, due at Marseilles from Odessa a week ago. She is supposed to have foundered during the recent gales with her crew of 45.

Norwegian Steamer Ashore.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—The Norwegian steamer Tordisjold, from Mexican ports for this port, is ashore near Jones Inlet, between Fire Island and Rockaway, and in need of assistance. The Oakland lifesaving crew have gone out to her. The sea is quiet.

Thousands Hear the Chimes.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—The usual holiday crowd gathered at Trinity church at midnight and listened to the chimes. It is estimated that 60,000 people gathered in the streets after the annual custom.
