

STATE NEWS

Editor McClure still alludes to Minot as the city of destiny. The Minneapolis and Northern elevator at Michigan City was destroyed by fire. Dr. Langhorst, for a long time county physician at Steele, has gone to Chicago. The fire loss of the Fargo Packing company has been adjusted at \$34,000. Another unknown man was found cut to pieces on the railroad tracks at Moorhead. Jacob Kraise, a Wells county boy, was run over by a tank wagon and will probably die. W. H. Whit, a former Fargo hotel keeper and relative of George Nichols, died recently in Vermont. Fargo people bade Bishop Edsall an official farewell at appropriate services at the church at Fargo. The eastern papers have enthusiastic articles regarding improved business and financial conditions in North Dakota. Claus Dick, a Cavalier county farmer, has been experimenting with hemp, and raised over 70 bushels from four acres of land last season. Judge Pollock denied the writ of habeas corpus for the Kohl children and they have been remanded to the care of the children's home. The case will be appealed to the supreme court. Devils Lake was the scene of an animated gathering of land buyers this week. The state school land sale was in progress there and purchasers were numerous. There is prosperity through Ramsey county this year. Land that sold for \$5 an acre a couple of years ago is now selling for \$20. The sale of school lands in Foster county aggregated \$41,250, one-fifth of which was paid in cash, making \$8,250.02. Most of the land sold for \$10 per acre except a half section bought by C. K. Wing that brought \$15 per acre. There were twenty-five quarter sections and forty-two acres sold. There is considerable strife at Courtenay over gambling. One young man lost a roll, and squealed. This got him into disfavor and it was attempted to shut him out of a dance. He presented his ticket at the muzzle of a gun and was allowed to dance. A pool room proprietor was arrested last week on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. Among the new postoffices established in North Dakota during the past month are Fillmore, Benson county; Judson, Morton county; and Rosedale, Towner county. The following offices were made money order depots during the same period: Hufflund, Knox, Maddock, Souris and Wilton. There were no offices discontinued and no changes in names. B. W. Fuller raised a fine crop of corn of the North Dakota dent variety this year. He had five acres of this variety and the yield was 100 bushels of corn in the cob per acre. The corn ripened in 75 days from planting. It was planted about June 1. Mr. Fuller has been very successful in corn raising and has a good yield this year from other varieties. He is of the opinion that much depends on the proper cultivation of corn.

UNFALTERING FAITH.

Steele Ozone: Another illustration of the saying that "everything comes to him who waits," is found in the reward of patience grit and unflinching work displayed by that staunch pioneer, John Satterlund, the present receiver of the United States land office at Bismarck and one of the founders of the town of Washburn, the McLean county capital. For twenty years, through varying fortunes of the slope, he has stayed by his "first intention," to make a town in that beautiful location on the Missouri. At times things looked dark and hopeless to many, but with his imperturbable air he would say, "Well, of course we can't have everything at once, but it will come around right in time." The railroad was staked to the town nearly or quite a score of years ago, but passengers continued to go in by stage, and freight by wagons and boat—and "King John" operated the stage line, and the hotel. Incidentally he has looked after the politics of the county. He never gave up. In his political labors he never looked out for himself—it was always some other fellow, even when serving in the legislature. Finally he took the federal post that was offered him, and kept on working for Washburn and McLean. Now the railroad actually runs into the town, elevators are built, and the town has grown out of its clothes. Along with its patient and big-hearted founder are many friends, neighbors and political associates and opponents, who share with King John the satisfaction and benefits of the awakening—not one of whom, we feel sure, will begrudge him a jot of the reward, of whatever nature, he may gather.
