THE WEATHER.

W. J. Pettie of Minneapolis came in on the noon train today and is visiting with old time Bismarck friends.

Mrs. J. D. White and daughter Mabel, of Stillman Valley, Ill., are visiting with Governor and Mrs. White.

Miss Elizabeth C. Tschirhart has been assigned to duty at the Bismarck land office, and has arrived to take her position.

H. L. Reade has resigned his position with H. L. Michelson, and goes with Will O'Hara in the Cash Store, soon to open.

Captain Parks, in command of Fort Lincoln, is a guest of Major Brosius in the city today. He expects his family to arrive tomorrow.

Rev. C. S. Mason, the Crittenton evangelist, will hold his first meeting in the city at the Baptist church at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

F. B. Allen came in today from Newark, where he has been for some time, and is, preparing to open the hunting season as soon as the law is up.

The funeral of Brakeman Fred Stevens will take place at Fargo, the home of the deceased man. He leaves \$4,000 insurance to his wife and children and owned his own home.

Mick O'Connor received a fine, thoroughbred English pointer last night that he has bought from Iowa parties. The animal is one of the finest ever brought to this city.

The ladies of the Episcopal church have decided to serve luncheon through the day, Saturday, July 23, to help with the accommodation of the crowds present for the Soo celebration.

There will be a called meeting of the Fortnightly club at the residence of Governor White tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. A full attendance desired as there is business of importance to consider.

A severe storm passed around the county to the south and east last night. It was visible in heavy banks of clouds, with vivid lightning. Reports from the reservation this morning state that the storm passed south of them.

The Northern Pacific will run a refrigerator car from Fargo for Bismarck and west, on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday of each week. The car will come up on train 53, unloaded here, and then taken to Mandan by the switch engine crew.

The death is reported of Miss Alice Klinefelter of Dickinson after a brief illness. She was taken ill in the twin cities, and died shortly after her return home. She was a daughter of the late Charles Klinefelter, and was engaged to be married to a young business man of Dickinson.

E. H. Walker of the Washburn road left last night for a trip to the twin cities, and will probably go on to Sault Ste. Marie. The Washburn people are looking for laborers to work on the road and in the coal mines, and Mr. Walker will endeavor to bring back a number of workmen.

Contractor Kennedy has just secured the contract for straightening out a piece of the main line of the Northern Pacific tracks, between Gladstone and Dickinson, making about 6,400 feet of work, and which, when completed, will shorten the distance about 400 feet. Two long curves are taken out.

Mrs. F. A. Briggs left on the limited last night for Seattle, Wash., whence she takes the transport August 29 for Nome, Alaska, in company with Lieutenant and Mrs. B. H. Pope. A number of friends were at the depot last night to bid her farewell and wish her a safe and successful journey. She will probably return to the states the coming summer.

Col. A. P. Peake was a guest in the city today, on his return from a trip to the mines in the western part of the state. He reports a total output from the consolidated mines last year of 26,000 tons and says it is expected to double that output this year. There will probably be an increase of about 25 cents a ton in the price of lignite in the local market the coming winter.

Fargo Call: Mrs. Fred Stevens, children and an uncle of Mr. Stevens, who lives at Valley City, returned last evening from Brainerd, where they went to attend Mr. Stevens before his death, Monday afternoon. An operation had been performed but the patient did not recover consciousness. The remains will be brought to the city this evening by James Gorman, a brother-in-law of

the deceased. It is the wish of the relatives that the funeral services be under the auspices of Fargo lodge A. O. U. W. and, while the arrangements are not completed as yet, it is likely the funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon.

The "Soo" people are assisting with the advertising for the celebration Saturday. They have made a special rate of a cent a mile, making the round trip rate from Minneapolis to Bismarck \$8.50, tickets good returning the 25th. The Soo has also issued a poster, giving the time of the train and rates from every station along the line between Bismarck and Minneapolis. These have been distributed all along the line of the Soo and will materially aid the local committee to advertise the celebration.

PREPARATIONS FOR CELEBRATION.

At a meeting of the executive committee for the Soo celebration held last night, arrangements were made for the erection of an arch and a committee was named to look after the work. It is proposed to erect and decorate a handsome arch probably on Main street, through which the parade will pass. The same committee will also make special efforts toward effective decorations along the street.

An invitation has been extended to Company M of Fort Lincoln to participate in the parade and exercises, and a special train will probably be arranged for to bring the crowd from Mandan and afterward bring up the troops from Lincoln.

A force of men is at work today clearing off the grounds adjacent to the Soo terminals, and getting them in readiness for the celebration. A request will be made to have the weed ordinance enforced, to the end that on the day of the celebration there may be no unsightly patches of weeds.

Col. Plummer has accepted the invitation to be present and make the principal speech of the day and that assures a rousing address, that will interest all who hear it.

The finance committee has collected over \$700 in subscriptions. The committee will make an effort to expend the money judiciously and give as good a show as possible.

The base ball committee have been given the privilege of erecting a grand stand at the grounds, and they will probably erect a stand that will seat about 500 people.

The arrival of the Soo train at 1 o'clock will make it necessary to hold the parade in the afternoon. It will probably be formed and in line ready to start as soon as the train arrives. The ball game will be called for 4 o'clock or thereabouts, and the program of small sports will be held in the evening, immediately after supper.

INTEREST IN DE MORES.

The New York Herald of Sunday last contained a column account of the trial of the murderers of the Marquis de Mores, illustrated with pictures of the three assassins who have been convicted, and of the Marquis and Madame de Mores. There is also a sketch of the western career of the Marquis de

Mores in North Dakota, and of his cattle packing industry at Medora. Credit is given his wife for the manner in which, almost single handed, she has pushed the case against his assassins and brought them to punishment.

A RAIN OF FISH.

Jamestown Alert: R. E. Wallace and son took five barrels of different kind of fish from the water holes along side the road near the Mutz school last week and put the young fish in Spiritwood lake. Several of the varieties were sent to the fish commissioner at Washington, with an account of the circumstances. It is supposed that the young fish rained down as no other means of propagation are known to have been used. There are said to be millions of the fish left in the little slough. While the superintendent, in charge of the government fish car, was here last year he stated that there was no doubt that young fish, frogs and lizards were deposited in rain fall.
