**Ladies' Guild**—The guild will meet next Thursday afternoon with Mrs. Plants. It is requested that those that can furnish teams take the other members that can go.

**Inspection**—According to a notice appearing elsewhere the board of railroad commissioners will inspect the Northern Pacific railroad through Burleigh county on June 27th.

**School Election**—The annual school election for the choice of one member of the board of education is in progress at the court house today. About one hundred votes had been cast up to 2 o'clock this afternoon and so far as known there was no opposition to the re-election of W. F. Cochrane, who has made an efficient and painstaking member of the board.

**Delegates Go to Lisbon**—Delegates to the meeting of the Women's Relief Corps for the state at Lisbon, left on the late train this morning. They intended to go on the afternoon train of yesterday, but the delay in the train out west prevented their departure until today. The delegates who will attend the meeting from this city are Mesdames W. O. Ward, A. N. Leslie, W. A. Falconer, E. L. Faunce, J. A. Rhodes, L. J. Marcelus and Miss Hatfield Sketon.

**Cause of Delay**—Traffic throughout eastern Montana on the Northern Pacific has been almost at a standstill as a result of severe cloudbursts. Near Park City a cloudburst sent a wall of water about twenty feet in height and about the same number of feet in width crashing down the valley, the creek sweeping away and destroying everything in its path. The Northern Pacific road spans the valley creek with a long wooden bridge over 100 feet high and one section with thirty feet of trestle was carried away. Fifteen miles west of Park City another cloudburst occurred, washing out many feet of roadbed and inundating several miles of farming land.

**Death of Fred Belknap.**  
 Fargo Forum: A letter from A. Charles Edwards, Chicago, received Sunday, contains the following concerning the late deceased husband of Mrs. Marie Edwards Belknap. "Up to the time of the operation June 12 Mr. Belknap suffered intensely, but contrary to the first report he was given an anesthetic before the operation was commenced. It was a very intricate and difficult task for the surgeons, and the patient was very weak, and passed away before the work could be completed, though every effort was made to restore respiration by artificial means. The operation was the only hope left of prolonging his life. His last conscious words were: 'My poor wife.'  
Mrs. Belknap was dumbfounded by the shock as she was full of hope, but is bearing up well. Her children are we and she will soon proceed with them to visit her sister-in-law at Oshkosh, Wis.  
"It has been decided to cremate the remains and place them in a vault until Mrs. Belknap perfects her plans for the future."

**EQUALIZERS ARE AT WORK**

City Board of Equalization Meets at the City Hall Today to Equalize City Property.

Some Figures from the Assessment Returns Showing Value of Property this Year.

The city board of equalization, comprising the mayor, aldermen and city auditor, met at the city hall this morning to begin upon the equalization of city property. How long they will sit is not definitely known, but as they are inclined to make a pretty thorough review of the work of the assessors, they will probably remain in session for several days. The assessment books have been filed with City Auditor Thistlethwaite for some time and include a reassessment of the real and personal property. There is a large addition to the number of descriptions of property assessed, owing to the fact that many descriptions of property that was off the tax roll last year, having been bidden in by the city for non-payment of taxes, has been bought by individuals and goes back on the tax rolls.

The total value of property in the city as returned by the assessors is approximately \$1,160,000. Of this amount, \$892,532 is real property and \$267,903 is personal. Of the real property, \$54,517 is set down as the value of lots and \$375,240 of the buildings thereon. This is somewhat increased over the assessment of last year, and the city board is likely to increase this amount still further.

Some of the items of the total personal assessment are: Goods and merchandise, \$80,110; bank stocks, \$42,343; city water system, \$20,000; electric light plant, \$7,200; diamonds and jewelry, \$2,155; household goods, \$35,236; pianos, \$6,920; cash, \$1,071. One individual gives in \$846 in cash and the other 4,000 residents of the city make up the other \$200.

A valuation of forty per cent of the inventory of stocks of merchandise was taken by the assessors as a basis for taxation. Last year the city board the valuation of stocks of goods far above the assessors figures and the state board of equalization reduced the property.
